

FEED DEALERS TO MEET SOON

Oregon Association to Convene at Corvallis on
June 25

Memorial Union hall, starting at 10 a. m., on Wednesday, June 25, has been selected as the place and the time for the general meeting of the feed men of Oregon, planned by the Oregon Feed Dealers association, according to a bulletin just sent to all members of the organization over the signature of W. C. Theda, president.

Trade practices, standards, and methods in the industry will form the basis for the morning session, which is being devoted to a conference and study session on problems of the conduct of the feed business.

Consumer relations, and coordination of feed dealer efforts to fit in with the general dairy industry program in bettering dairy conditions, will stand out as the feature of the afternoon session. Prof. P. M. Brandt, Prof. I. R. Jones, and H. E. Cooby, of the poultry staff, will all have a part in the afternoon program, telling the feed men of the need for and methods of enlisting feed industry aid for Oregon farmers.

Farm Prosperity Issue
"Primary interest of the June 25 meeting," said Pres. Theda, in discussing the session, "centers about the plans to turn the organized strength of the feed industry into the balance for the betterment of farm prosperity in Oregon. Closer to the farmer than any other considerable group, the feed industry has perhaps a better opportunity than any other group to give intelligent and effective impetus to any program of increasing farm efficiency, putting business methods to work on farms, and aiding from the production end the able work of the dairy products promotion campaign, headed by Prof. Brandt of the state college, and promoted by the Oregon dairymen and the National Dairy council. Both the disposition and the interest of the feed industry is in line with all such efforts, and this meeting should give us a more clearly outlined plan of campaign."

a prominent member of the Knights of Pythias lodge.

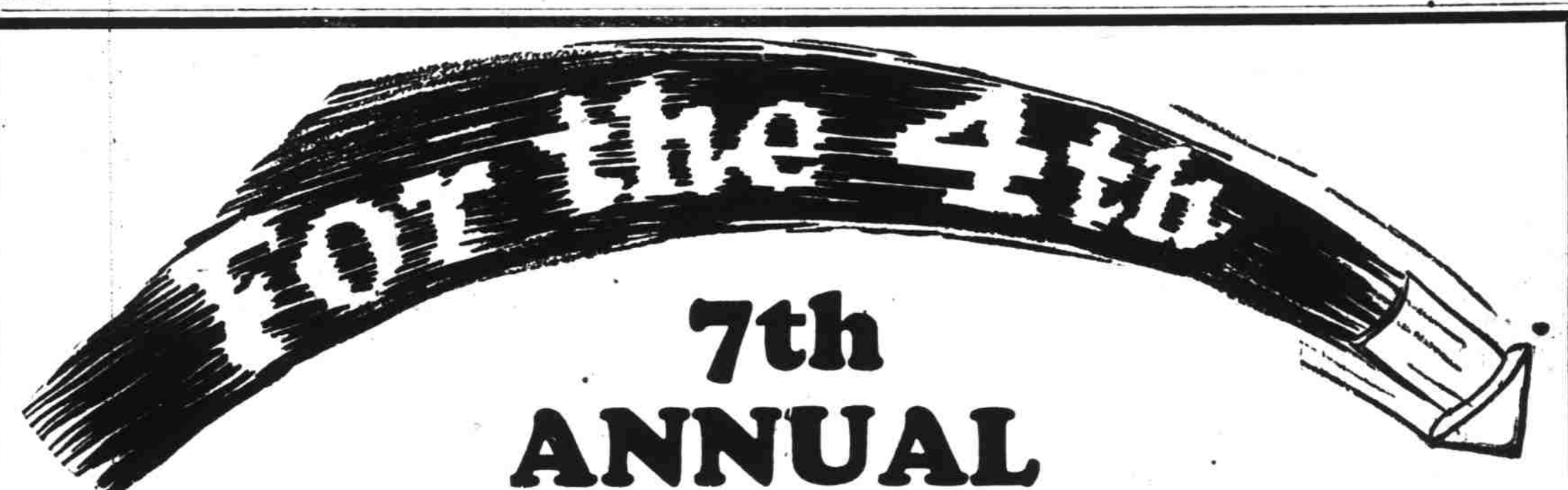
NEW HOME BURNS
