

FRIENDLY SUIT PLAN DROPPED

Elliott Confers Here With
City Officials; Plant
Inventory Offered

went over the ground covered on previous visits here. "We want to cooperate with the Salem government in meeting the wishes of the citizens. We think it would look poor for us to say this and then launch a suit; the council and the commission might understand but the action to the people would look as though we were not keeping our pledge of good faith."

Elliott, citing in round numbers the cost of the plant here, said his firm had expended \$792,000 for the plant, while it had also paid \$80,000 additional for capital improvements to the system made between the time the deal was made with the Wallace interests and the time the water system was actually taken over. From May 1, 1927 up to May 30, 1930, the Oregon-Washington company has expended \$360,178 in capital improvements, Mr. Elliott stated. He said his firm's investment, to date, in the Salem water system was \$1,268,685. Mr. Elliott was not certain whether a depreciation reserve had been set up to care for yearly reduction in capital value or whether the depreciation percentage had been put back into capital investment and included in the total capital figures he brought.

Appraisal Work To Begin Soon

Mr. Elliott told the committee and the commission that the net profits of the company for the last 18 months were \$31,413, this sum coming before depreciation, federal income tax payments or any payments on bonds of the company.

Accompanying Mr. Elliott north on his trip to Salem was J. D. Adams, lawyer of the firm of McCutchen, Olney, Mannon & Greene. As soon as the complete inventory of property owned by the company can be had, East & Cunningham, engineers employed by the city to make the evaluation, will try to agree with the water company on the actual equipment owned by the firm and with this as a basis, to proceed with the appraisal to be finished as near to August 31, 1930, as possible. At that time the city is expected to make an offer to the water company for its holdings and according to Elliott, his company is ready to retire from the picture just as soon as a price can be agreed upon. He indicated that his company's vision of the future of the city is that it should receive the full amount of its investment locally without accretion or decrease.

Crypto-Ad Reform Is Projected

Cryptograms like this are to be removed from the classified advertising columns of Pacific coast newspapers, to be replaced by a standard series of abbreviations that will enable the advertiser to save words and make it possible for the reader to understand the "want ad," if the abbreviations advocated by the Pacific Coast Advertising Managers association are adopted.

Malcolm Burgess, classified advertising manager for the San Francisco Call-Bulletin, presented the plan to the association, which is meeting with the Pacific Advertising Clubs association convention here.

"This is the first move of the kind in the United States toward making the want ads entirely intelligible," said George Hager, Spokane, president of the group.

feel that the entire school benefited by it."

Ninety-two per cent of the home room teachers want to continue with that work next year, and retain the greater part of their students, the report says.

Mr. Wolf's review of the year's work also says: "I thoroughly believe the one hour period in all high schools is here to stay. Using them in Salem for the first time this year caused a little dissatisfaction among some people but out general outcome has been excellent and nearly 100 per cent of the teachers heartily endorse the plan."

Recommendation that the period be lengthened five minutes next year is contained in the report.

List of suggested repairs for the various school buildings was gone over by the board, with most of the matters being held up for consideration at the next meeting. Decision to paint the interior of the Grant building was reached, and it may be the modern idea of tinted classrooms will be developed in this work.

The \$30 deficit reported by the Parrish school cafeteria was recognized by the board, however it was made clear that the board expects all school cafeterias to break even at the end of the year.

Dr. M. H. Olinger, incumbent, and Mrs. Roy Keene, successful candidates at the school election, were sworn in and the board reorganized. Dr. Olinger was retained as chairman and Director E. L. Weider was named vice-chairman.

GODFREY BARRED BECAUSE OF FOUL

PHILADELPHIA, June 24.—(AP)—The Pennsylvania state athletic commission took prompt action today as a result of last night's fiasco in which George Godfrey the giant negro, fouled Primo Carnera and lost the fight to the huge Italian.

After Godfrey admitted to the commission he had unintentionally delivered a low blow that body revoked Godfrey's license to appear in Pennsylvania rings and cut his purse of \$10,000 in half. Carnera received his full purse of \$43,641.

Carnera was also a sufferer today at the hands of the commission for something with which he had nothing to do. He, his managers and the whole Carnera stable of boxers were suspended pending a further hearing on a row that occurred in Carnera's dressing room before the fight.

Jack Silvers, one of the preliminary fighters, refused to obey a commission order to wear the regulation protective device. Silvers was backed up by Carnera's managers and the heat of the argument that followed resulted in blows being struck. Francis Connelly, a deputy inspector for the commission, who had insisted on the protective requirement, was on the receiving end of one blow that gave him a cut lip and loose teeth.

Big Primo knew nothing about the scrap until he arrived at the dressing room, but the suspension of the Carnera stable automatically operated against him.

"Pre-War" Goes Down Drain Pipe

Tuesday was clean-house day in the justice court.

STOCK MARKET IS DOWNGRADE AGAIN

NEW YORK, June 24.—(AP)—Unsettled by the weakness of wheat and the investment rails, speculative sentiment turned decidedly bearish in the last half hour of today's stock market and prices broke throughout the entire list. Yesterday's advances were more than eliminated and the weighted index of 90 shares.

July wheat tumbled nearly four cents a bushel, selling just above 88 cents, another low for 16 years. Cotton was also heavy, although late covering held the net losses to 9 to 27 points.

Liquidation of the rails, many of which went to the lowest levels in several years, went forward persistently in the afternoon after publication of figures showing that net operating income of first 12 carriers to report for May had declined 27.9 per cent from the same month a year ago. This decline was less than the decreases in either March or April, but it lent capital to the bears who extended their activities to the utilities and rails.

Boy Faces Trial For Killing Dog Of His Neighbor

Floyd Deharport, 19, 2140 Mill street faces the charge of cruelty to an animal in justice court here following his shooting of the small Fox Terrier dog belonging to Anna Rotzkin. He has been allowed until today to raise bail of \$250 and to consult an attorney.

According to the story told Justice Small, Deharport shot the dog in the rear claiming the terrier had been bothering his own dog. The 13-year-old son of the owner of the dog found his pal in the middle of the street and hauled the animal home, and later took the dog to a veterinarian. The bullet had fatally injured the dog and nothing remained but to kill him.

Old Time Fourth Affair Plan For Green's Bridge
