Southern Cross First to Cross Ocean Westward Without Mishap

safe landing place. Although fatigued by their many hours of flying and the mental strain provided by the final few hours, the aviators were happy in the thought they at least had conquered the Atlantic but did not hide their disappointment at their failure to reach New York.

Plans were formulated for resuming the flight. With a start at daybreak it is hoped to reach New York tomorrow night. There the plane will be refueled and then continue on to San Francisco for the last lap in a "round the world" flight.

The story of the flight as told by the aviators was a story of danger. A few hours after leaving Dublin, the Southern Cross encountered bad weather and the visibility became poor. For 20 out of 24 hours the men flew blindly in their quest for the eastern shores of North America. Their distance finding apparatus did not prove satisfactory. They turned on their compass for guidance and when this deserted them to the messages from ships and radio stations. It was only by the aid of the ever watchful radio operators on the ships and at the stations that the navigators were able to establish their position.

Fog Bank Destroys Sense of Direction. For hours this condition continued, the fliers said, yet satisfactory progress was made. But the elements were against them and 500 miles off the Newfoundland coast the plane entered a fog bank that destroyed all sense of direction. Sticking doggedly to the trail straight ahead they finally sighted land and made for it. They knew it must be Newfoundland and started a search for Harbor Grace.

Sale of German Bonds Protested By Andy Mellon

WASHINGTON, June 25—(AP)—Unqualified opposition to the McFadden resolution to prohibit purchase of German reparations bonds by American banks was expressed today by Secretary Mellon on the ground it was unnecessary and government interference with private capital would not be "sound policy."

Appearing before the house banking committee, Mellon described the measure as "meaningless" because federal reserve banks have no authority to purchase such bonds, national banks are limited to the purchase of "marketable securities" under regulations prescribed by the comptroller of the currency and state banks are governed by state law.

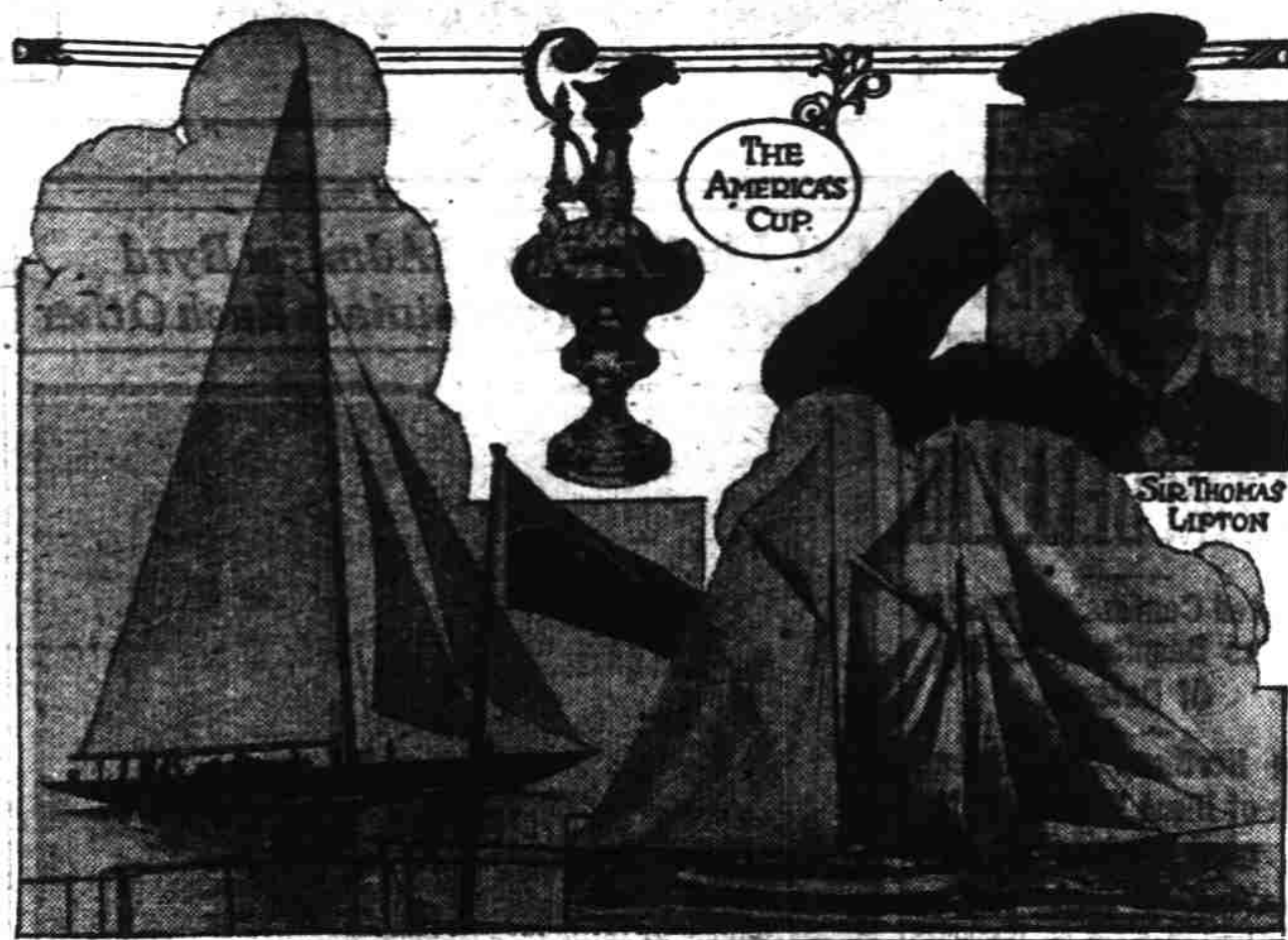

CONGRESS AWAITS VETS' BILL VETO

WASHINGTON, June 25—(AP)—Congress today prepared itself to receive tomorrow from President Hoover a veto of the Johnson veterans relief bill and promptly to enact substitute legislation to benefit World War service men.

With completion of congressional action on the Johnson measure, the house cleared the way for quick action on the veto and for the new bill designed to meet the objections raised by Mr. Hoover to the one lying on his desk. The house will act first on the veto, the bill having originated in that branch. More than a sufficient number of the 264 republicans—154—pledged themselves at a closed conference last night to sustain the veto. It requires a two-third majority of those voting to override a veto.

After the vote is taken to sustain the veto, Speaker Longworth plans to submit the Johnson substitute bill for action under suspension of rules. Debate will be limited to twenty minutes for all and no amendments may be offered. Republicans leaders are confident it will pass.

RADIO SCHOOL IS USED BY FARMERS

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—More than 200 farmers in Oregon are going to night school every Wednesday—by radio. These farmers are enrolled in a soil improvement course started several months ago by Dr. W. L. Powers, chief in soils at Oregon State college, who started the class over the college station KOAC as an experiment, with a bare half dozen "students."

The course proved so popular that farmers from all sections of the state registered and now, in addition to listening regularly, receive especially prepared circulars each month on the subjects discussed.

To this radio class, Dr. Powers is distributing the results of a soil survey of nine million acres of Oregon land. He is also giving the findings of 30 years of experiments including crop rotation and irrigation tests which show possible profitable returns from supplemental irrigation on a half million acres in the Willamette valley.

HOSS DIDN'T DENY INITIATIVE TITLE

Status of Public Service Commission Abolition Movement Explained

Correction of a wrong impression given in a Portland news story regarding withdrawal of initiative petitions sponsored by George Bylander seeking the abolition of the public service commissioner was made late Wednesday by Secretary of State Hoss who was held by Bylander to have refused him a ballot title to his measure.

Hoss, citing a letter written June 20 to Bylander, said he stood entirely on the legal grounds furnished him by Attorney-General Van Winkle to whom ballot title cases were recently submitted. The attorney-general held that proper preliminary petitions should be filed with the secretary of state before ballot titles were prepared. Van Winkle declared this procedure was in accord with the law and would save complications to people seeking to institute initiative measures.

Offered to Take Matter Up Again

Hoss concludes his letter as follows:

"In view of the developments brought about by court action, it was deemed advisable to confer with the attorney-general when you presented for approval a few days ago, the printer's proofs of the petition you contemplated circulating for signatures. At that time, the attorney-general pointed out that the papers constituting the original notice of your initiative proposal as filed by you on January 24, 1929, were not in the form prescribed by statute, and advised that the secretary of state could not approve the printed forms for that reason. However, inasmuch as the ballot title has been written, if the completed petition is offered for filing and contains the requisite number of signatures, and is in the form furnished to you under date of February 2, 1929, the matter will again be taken up with the attorney-general for his advice respecting the authority of the secretary of state to accept and file such petition."

Bylander is said to have secured 3243 signatures of the 15,556 required by law.

COMMUNIQUE FAILS TO DENY ILLNESS

VATICAN CITY, June 25—(AP)—In the face of widespread reports Pope Pius was suffering from an old bladder disorder the semi-official daily Vatican Communiqué today stressed how active the pontiff has been the last few years, although it made no denial that he was troubled with the disease.

Neither did it make formal admission physicians had been consulted and an operation was possible, as had been reliably reported.

The Communiqué instead cited ceremonies the Pope has attended lately and speeches he has pronounced as proof of his vigor, asserting "Pius XI not only has changed nothing in his habitual manner of life but has been more active than ever."

The Communiqué also cited the Pope's recent visit to the Vatican Museums and his attendance at the 50th anniversary of the unification of Italy.

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Fraud Charged As Case Opens

YOUNGSTOWN, OHIO, June 25—(AP)—Charges of international fraud and dereliction of duty were made today as a formidable array of attorneys fired the opening guns for and against the billion dollar merger of Bethlehem Steel Corporation with the Youngstown Sheet & Tube company, in Mahoning county common pleas court.

The objective of the battle is a permanent injunction to prevent the merger.

LOS ANGELES, June 25.—(AP)—Dr. P. G. White, who performed an operation upon King C. Gillette, 76, inventor of the safety razor, today said his patient's condition is precarious "but satisfactory, considering his age."

Gillette has been in the hospital for six weeks.

ROSENBLUM CHAMP BUFFALO, N. Y., June 25.—(AP)—Jimmy Slatery, lost his light heavy-weight title before the home folks tonight in a 15 round duel with Maxie Rosenbloom, slap-
