REVISED LABOR LAW HELD NEED

Commissioner Wants Power To Compel Payment of Wages Earned

Amendment of the existing statutes which would empower the state labor commissioner to compel the payment of wage claims by Oregon workmen, will be sought at the next session of the legislature, according to announcement made here by C. H. Gram, head of the Oregon labor department.

A somewhat similar bill to the one now being prepared by Mr. Gram was defeated at the 1929 legislature for the reason that the legislators contended that there was no demand for such legislation. Since that time Gram has received many requests to collect accounts for workmen but has been unable to do so because of the inadequate laws now on the statute books in this state. It was said Gram would have the support of the state federation of labor and other similar organizations.

Advantage Taken of Weak Statute

The existing laws do not give the labor commissioner power to collect wages due workers, and as a result many fly-by-night employers have left the state owing large amounts of money to their employees. In some cases workers who have been unable to collect for their labor have been compelled to seek charity.

Although handicapped by inadequate laws, Gram has succeeded in collecting some accounts due workers. During one year the labor commissioner adjusted 1048 claims, which involved a total of \$59,174.31. In the same period of time he was successful in collecting 2003 claims. In virtually all of these cases the employers took advantage of the inadequate laws and refused to pay. Gram was helpless and could not take the cases into court.

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O. S. C. WON'T ENTER CONTEST

Claims Unfair Treatment in Last Constitution Oratory

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, June 25 (Special).—Student orators of this college will no longer compete in the national contest on the constitution nor will the college assist in promoting these contests for the Better America Federation, the public speaking department announced.

The action followed the throwing out of the zone contest held here and won by an Oregon State student, Denver Garner, and the reholding of it in Los Angeles where a Pomona college man was declared winner.

C. B. Mitchell, head of the department here, has charged the management which has headquarters in Los Angeles, with rank injustice to the Oregon man and other state winners not in California. The contest here was thrown out because a local high school instructor was one of the five judges, though all arrangements had been approved in advance by a high official of the management. Scores revealed that even had this man placed Garner last and the second man won.

Without granting a hearing, Mitchell says, the new contest was ordered and was held in Los Angeles with seven Los Angeles judges. First place was given to a Pomona college man and second to a student in the University of California at Los Angeles.
