

Sheep Breeders to Meet July 12 at Floyd Fox Stock Farm

FLOYD FOX TO BE HOST

Waldo Hills Stock Farm Will Be Scene of Sheep Fan- ciers Picnic

Sheep breeders from all parts of the Willamette valley will gather at the Floyd Fox farm in the Waldo Hills Saturday, July 12 for the first sheep picnic ever held in this territory.

The Waldo Hills Stock farm, owned by Mr. Fox, has won recognition all over the west for the fine sheep produced there. The location of the farm is particularly suited to an out of door picnic and Mr. and Mrs. Fox have planned many features for the entertainment of their guests.

The program will include sheep judging by boys and girls and adult teams, a showmanship contest, a trimming demonstration and displays of the Shropshire, Dorset and Oxford sheep owned by Mr. Fox.

Speakers of the day will include O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock show, H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader, R. A. Ward and Edgar Lindgren of the Pacific Cooperative wool growers association, Professors Potter and Lindgren of O. S. C. Alex Cruickshank of McMinnville, well known sheep breeder and winner of the Moses trophy, Frank Brown of Carlton, well known Yamhill county sheep man, and others.

At noon a lunch will be served by Mr. and Mrs. Fox which will feature mutton sandwiches. There will be something doing all day and the fun is scheduled to start at 10 a. m. More than 100 head of show sheep will be on display and any one who is interested in sheep is invited to attend the picnic.

Representatives from Marion, Polk, Clackamas, Lane, Linn, Yamhill and Multnomah counties have already signified their intention of being present. Additional program features will be announced later.

M. J. Ballantyne Called Beyond

DALLAS, June 26—Rev. M. J. Ballantyne, who has been ill for the past year, died at his home on Hayter street, Tuesday afternoon. He would have been 75 years old in August. He was born in Pennsylvania in 1853, and had spent nearly all of his life in the ministry of the Evangelical church. He was an instructor in the Dallas college as long as it was maintained here.

Mr. Ballantyne is survived by his widow and seven children, all of whom were home in March

when Mr. and Mrs. Ballantyne celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. The children are: Mrs. Lewis Hadley, Walter, and Lew Ballantyne of Dallas, Donald of Seattle, Roscoe of Butte, Mont., Virgil of Pine Ridge, Ore., and Rev. Victor Ballantyne of Lewisville.

Services were held at the Evangelical church in Dallas, 2 o'clock, Thursday, with Rev. Jacob Stoker in charge.

WING DAM PROVES DIFFICULT TASK

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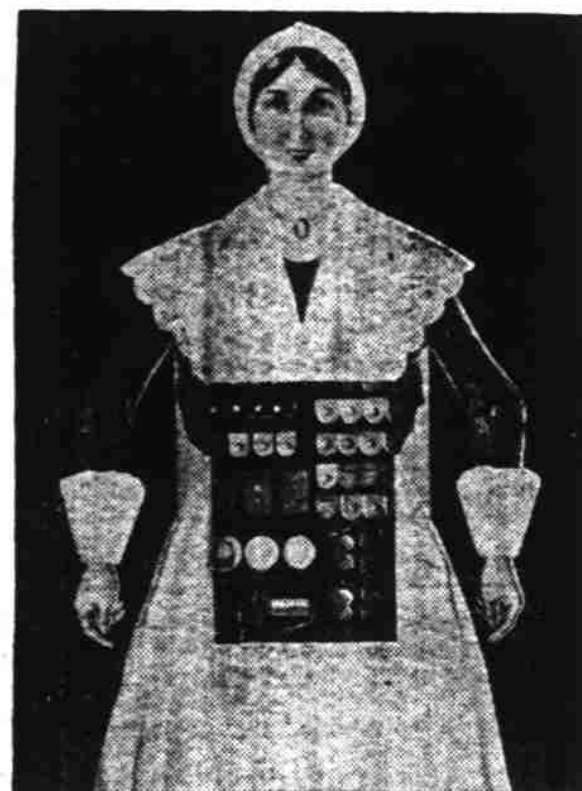
