Week's Sermonette Variety in Unity

Salvation is an individual matter. You cannot match two faces in a crowd, two flowers in the woodlands of spring, two heads of grain in the golden harvest, yet the whole reveals the vast creation of God in one marvelous variety in unity.

Turn the pages of sacred history and you will find God did not call two men in the same way, nor give to men either the same revelation or the same message. No two had the same work to accomplish, but were equipped accordingly. No two passed through the same experience; and there is evidenced degrees of the Spirit.

Recognizing this and obeying the text would avoid much misunderstanding, and lessen the great field of doubt.

"Sow to YOURSELVES — Break Up Your FALLOW Ground" — How long? Until THE LORD COMES . . . on you individually.

It is not obeying this text, or any other text, until you have had the same experience I have had. It is, until it is the "Righteousness of the LORD;" not your righteousness, because yours is as "filthy rags."

Some rest on one experience, some on two, some on three; but God has said "To every one that THIRSTETH, COME!" until the "cup" is satisfied. This is the important factor.

And when Christ is here, quit quibbling so much over wholesale or standardized experiences and make it a matter of individual "Rain of Righteousness from the Lord" and His "Satisfying our thirst" Pentecost will be reproduced in our lives.
