What Paris is Wearing

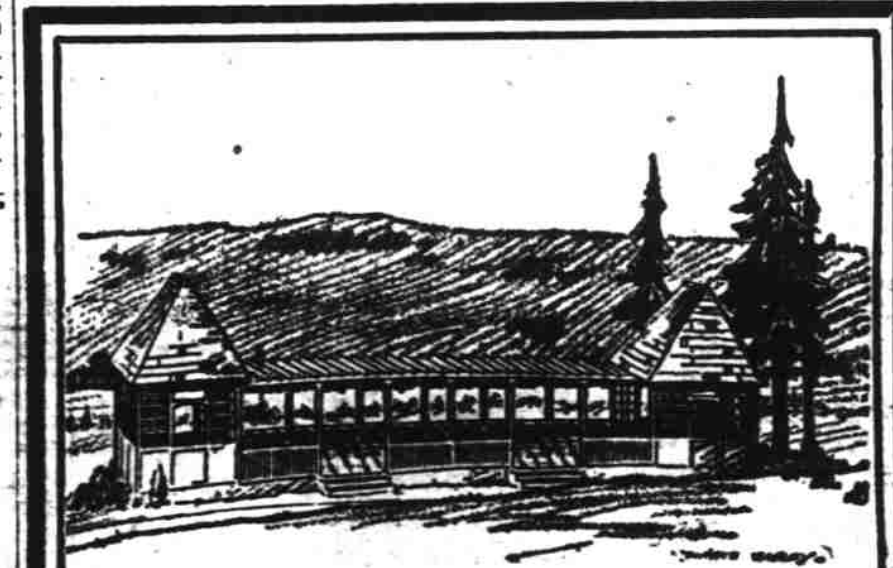
PARIS—Western America is responsible for at least one new fashion that Paris has created for summer. It is the cowboy scarf—a small square of printed silk, worn tied back of the neck, in approved cowpunch fashion. French women add their own feminine touch by fastening the point of the scarf low on the blouse with an immense bar-pin.

Not only printed scarfs that resemble the cowboy's bandana come within the range of this new style, but afternoon and dinner dresses often add a scarf of filmy chiffon or lace, in pale pink or flesh tints, and complete it with a pin set with diamonds and emeralds.

As Paris wears it, the scarf is always so adjusted that the long V-shaped point is accentuated and is crossed diagonally with a pin of large proportions. When the kerchief has a pronounced border, the V-line gives the effect of a deep décolletage, and gives an emphasis to slender waistlines.
