45 YEARS IN SHOE TRADE TEACHES JOHN R. POLLOCK THERE'S MUCH YET TO LEARN

"Two-Thirds of People's Time Spent in Shoes, Little Heed Paid to Them"

"People live two-thirds of their lives in their shoes and then know nothing about them." So saying

John R. Pollock picked up a shoe, gave a sole that had come in for rebirth a disgusted inspection and picked up another shoe.

John R. Pollock was born in Liverpool, England, just one mile from the largest dock in the world 58 years ago. Not long after that his father came to grief in his business and the family tore loose its English roots and came first to Quebec and then to Minneapolis. Here at the age of 13 the boy that is now Mr. Pollock, went to work running errands in a shoe store and for the last 45 years he has been growing up in the shoe business and still has much to learn according to his own idea.

After seven years in the store where he started "running errands," Mr. Pollock had charge of a "Treadwell Shoe Co. branch store; from there he had charge of a shoe department for Knobs and Shoe Co., in one of the large Minneapolis stores. Following several years here he went "on the road" for a shoe concern and sold shoes in this way, and then he changed to the manufacturing end of the shoe business.

Ran Vital Machine
In the manufacturing business Mr. Pollock was a worker in a large eastern factory. There was one machine which took skill and experience to run and all the young workers had an eye on the time that they would be able to run this machine. "I finally landed that job," laughed Mr. Pollock. And in this work he learned the mechanics of making shoes.

Again he went into the selling end of the shoe business for a short time and then came west to Salem in 1911, accompanied by Mrs. Pollock and their young daughter, John Pollock, Jr., was born after Mr. and Mrs. Pollock came to Salem.

For a short time after reaching Salem Mr. Pollock was with the Reinhardt Shoe Co. and then he started a shoe repairing business of his own in the old building which was torn down later to make way for the Capitol Drug store. From there he moved to the Waters building and later sold his business and went into the Price Shoe Co. for a short time. Again he started a repair business of his own taking over the store of John Paris, on Ferry street. Now Mr. Pollock has moved into large new quarters on South Liberty street.

Mr. Pollock likes the shoe business for it is interesting and requires constant application to keep up with the change of styles. A shoe repair man must be able to follow the original construction of the shoe upon which he is working, according to Mr. Pollock. It used to be that all soles were "welts" and "turn" soles—then came the MacKay method of stitching soles to shoes and now there is fast being developed a method of cementing soles to shoes. But to tack a sole that was originally sewed will bring disaster to the shoe being repaired and it is not possible to sew a sole that has been tacked. This people do not understand, in fact says Mr. Pollock, people know little or nothing about their shoes. They buy them because they look well—that is most women do or because Mrs. So and So has a pair like them, or because it is the style. At this point Mr. Pollock held up a high-heeled shoe and placed beside it a man's shoe. Said he, "They both start out to a picnic. Can you see how the high heeled one ever gets over the ground?"

"People wear shoes all their lives and yet it is the one thing they do not study nor buy because they understand. They even can talk intelligently about their electric refrigerator but their shoes—they buy for looks too many times. People are taught to sew in school, to take care of their automobile, to care for their health, but never are they really taught to buy and wear shoes. There are as many kinds of feet to be fitted as there are dispositions, yet shoes are bought for looks and dispositions, and marriages and businesses suffer."

So one sees repairing shoes is a science and it breeds philosophy. Mr. Pollock is an Elk and belongs to the Unitarian church.

Madras Bank's Depositors Get Dividend Checks

The state banking department Monday mailed to 297 claimants of the commercial department of the Madras State bank, insolvent, dividend checks aggregating \$4,572.29, or five per cent of the total claims. Commercial department claims of the bank totalled \$91,764.70.
