CROP OUTLOOK HELD GOOD

Jefferson District Reports Strawberry Season Nearly Over

JEFFERSON, July 1—Strawberry picking is about finished in this vicinity. The yield was not as heavy as was anticipated, but the berries were large, owing to the late rains. The grower's having their crops contracted, made it difficult for the housewives to get canning berries.

Cherry picking is well under way, with only a fair crop. The loganberry crop outlook is good. Picking commenced Monday.

Hay harvest has begun, the crop is good, owing to plenty of moisture and good growing weather. The prairie crop looks promising. R. C. Thomas reports that his orchard will yield better than last year, which was half a crop. V. D. Looney expects a fine crop from his orchard, two miles west of town.

Full sown grain is heading. The heads are not as large, but the quality of grain is good. The spring grain has a good color, and is stooling out well.
