# SEASHORE LURES KINGWOOD FOLK

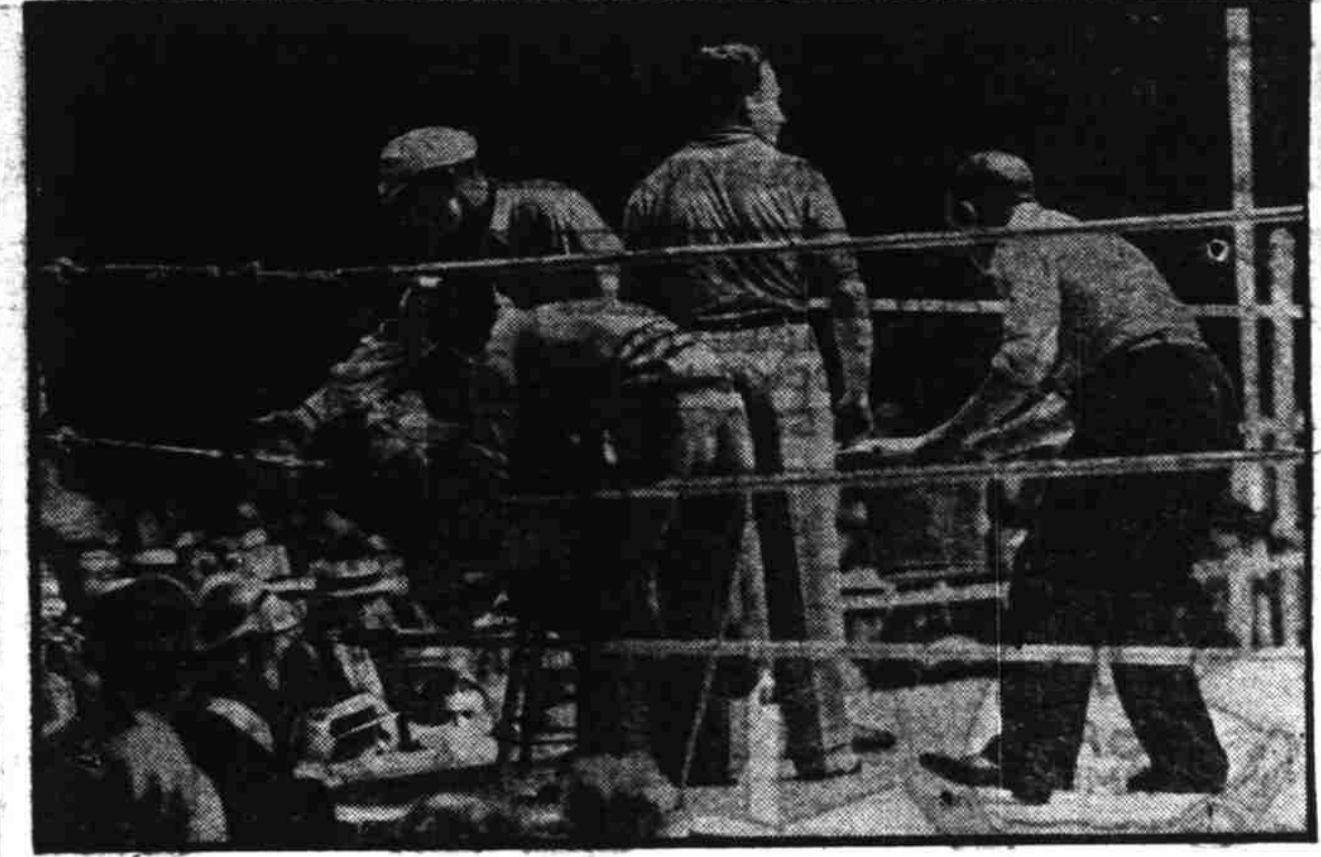

### Family Gathering Honors Wedding Anniversary of Members

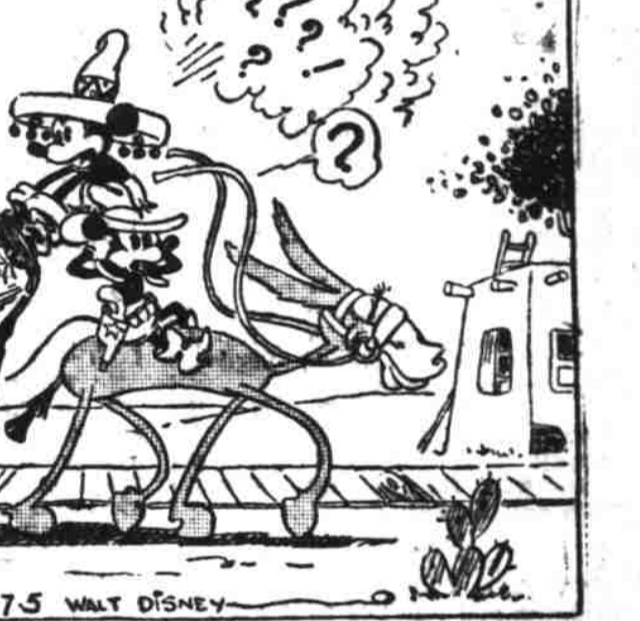
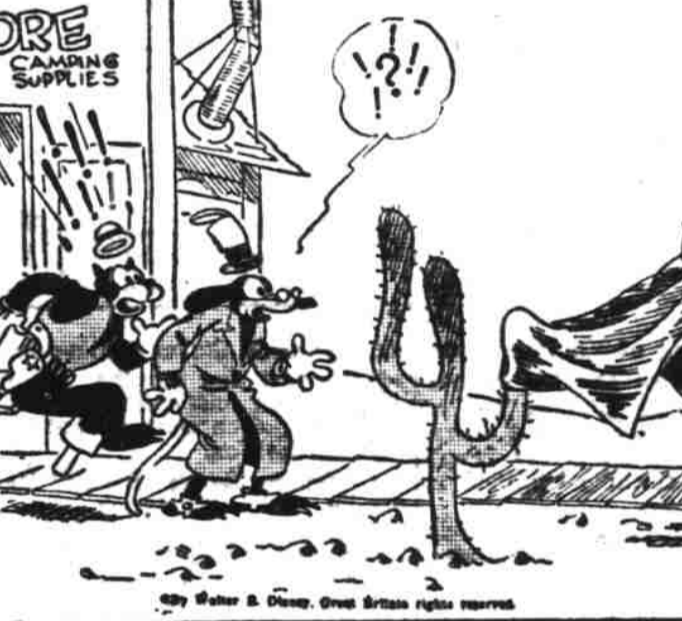

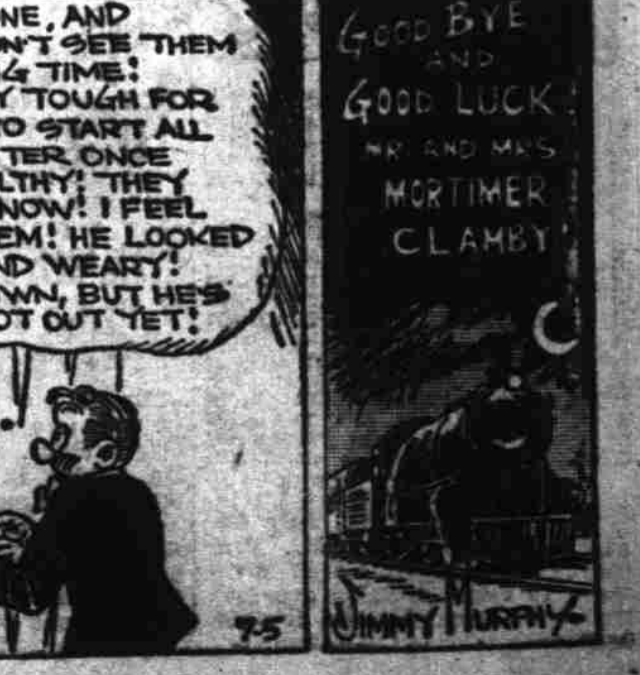
