Hoblitts Will Take Possession of Plant August 1 is Plan

SILVERTON, July 10.—John T. Hoblitt and his son, Mahlon Hoblitt, are again owners of the Silverton Appeal by a deal completed here this morning.

Hoblitt owned the Appeal for nearly 20 years and in December sold it to H. T. Allen of Deer Lodge, Montana. After traveling a short time, Hoblitt bought the St. Melens Mist but within a month sold it back to the former owner. The saying, "They always come back to Silverton," has again been justified in the case of the Hoblitt families.

Mr. Allen will relinquish his ownership of the Appeal August 1, but has not announced his future plans.

Mahlon Hoblitt is returning to Silverton from Los Angeles where he and Mrs. Hoblitt have made their home for the past several months and will be associated with his father in the publication of the Appeal.

ZENA ORCHARDS BUSY PLACES

Cherries in Hills Ripen Late So That Picking is on This Week

ZENA, July 10.—Picking started Monday in the A. P. McKinley cherry orchards situated in the Zena hills. J. F. McKinley of Salem is general manager. R. H. Scott, orchard manager, and James Shepard, assistant A. P. McKinley usually comes from his home in Los Angeles to superintend harvesting his crop, but is teaching at Berkeley this summer.

The cherries were badly cracked by the rain, making it necessary to sort them. Four sorters were employed Monday and Tuesday, but because of the added expense and the cherries will be sorted as the pickers gather them from the trees.

The McKinley and Balmey Breezes Gap cherry orchards are always the last to be picked at Zena as they are located high in the hills and the cherries ripen more slowly than those near the valley.

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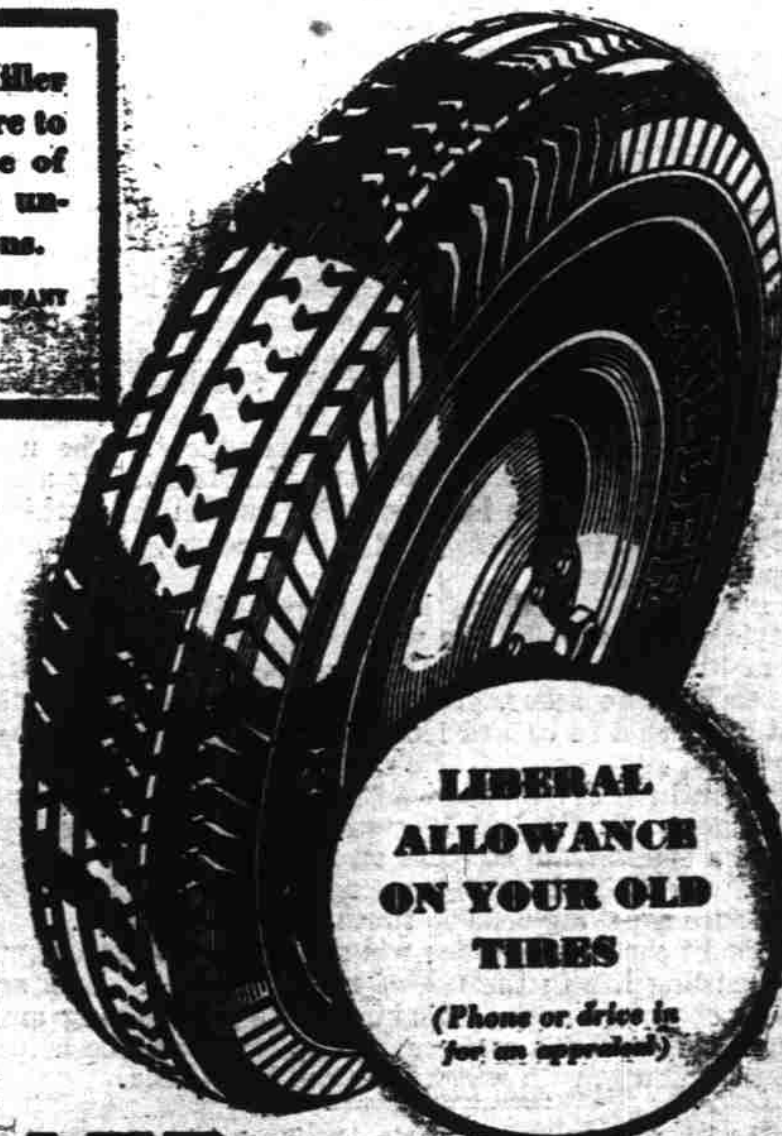
