give the senate. Reed volunteered to show them in confidence to the Californians and the latter replied he did not understand "any one who would accept such an offer or the temperamental makeup of any senator who would make such an offer."

Johnson asked Reed if Japan did not reserve the right to abandon the 5-5 ratio after 1935. Reed said she did and the United States in turn reserved the right to insist upon that ratio or even a lower one.

Senator McKellar, democrat, Tennessee, foe of the treaty, is ready to submit two reservations—one insisting upon freedom of the seas in war as well as in peace. The other would call for the removal by Great Britain of her naval bases in the vicinity of the American continent.

While treaty proponents have agreed to accept the modified reservation of Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, providing no secret agreement or understanding shall be ratified in approval of the pact, they have laid down a ban against other reservations and no hope is held for them.

the rates to and from Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Roseburg and other southern Oregon points. While reductions will doubtless result to Willamette valley points, the amount thereof will be less.

Association Urged
Petition Decried
Complete denial of the Southern Pacific application, we likewise urged that if the commission felt that circumstances required that fourth section relief be granted to the Southern Pacific company, the intermediate rates should not be more than 100 per cent in excess of the port to port rates, which limitation has apparently been adopted.

"The first class rate between San Francisco and Medford is now 375 per cent of the San Francisco-Portland first class rate, while the fifth class rate to Medford is 234 per cent of the fifth class rate to Portland. A comparison made of a number of representative commodities shows that rates proposed by the Southern Pacific company to intermediate high points averaged 225 per cent of the earnings to Portland.

Increases Denied
By Commission
Using sugar as an example, the high intermediate rate proposed was at Portland, the rate asked being 68 cents in contrast to a proposed San Francisco-Portland rate of 24 cents. If Portland be used as the basing point under the commission's order, no more than 48 cents could be charged in case the company desires to maintain the 24 cent rate between San Francisco and Portland.

"If Puget Sound points be used as a base for forwarding intermediate rates reductions to western Oregon points would be greater. If the Southern Pacific continued its attempt to compete with the boat lines for port to port traffic."

"The granting of the Southern Pacific application would have resulted in some substantial increases in rates for Salem, Albany, Eugene, and other Willamette valley points. These increases are specifically denied by the commission."

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BUSINESS BUREAU POSTERS RECEIVED

Salem industries are this week receiving their quota of posters being issued by the National Better Business Bureau reminding executives and employees alike that signing on the dotted line on any printed form is not just a formality.

"Read Before You Sign" is one of the slogans of the National Better Business Bureau. The warning has to be heeded by business executives as well as industrial and office employees. The bureau reports that swindling schemes based on getting a signature on a printed form involve a principle that a slick salesman works on business men as readily as on individuals who usually are not trained to be cautious about what they sign.

According to the bureau, those who "trip" on the dotted line" range from the officer of a large corporation who signs what he thinks is a questionable check in reality is a bona fide contract, to the housewife who signs a form which the salesman on her doorstep says is "merely a formality" but which is a commitment to buy something and usually at an exorbitant price.

The bureau's warning reads in part: "Don't be misled into thinking signatures are unimportant. They are very important. Before you sign, if you are a salesman's representative, are not born out in the printed agreement, don't sign."
