

M. P. ABSGONDS WITH MACE OF BRITISH KINGS

Emblem of Parliamentary Authority is Quickly Returned to Place

Beckett, Laborite, Seizes Sacred Symbol After Friend Suspended

LONDON, July 17.—(AP)—A member of parliament of today's session of common law off with the mace, almost sacred symbol of parliamentary authority, that rests on a table below the speaker's chair. The incident created a scene without precedent in the history of the mother of parliaments since Cromwell exclaimed "take away that bauble" and the mace was removed.

The incident was John Beckett, laborite. His action which he accompanied with the words "it's a damned disgrace," was in protest against suspension of Fenner Brockway, by almost unanimous vote on motion of remier MacDonald.

Brockway had overstepped his bounds by trying to make a speech on Indian during question time.

Beckett Tackled

By Guard at Door

Beckett did not get far with his trophy. An attendant tracked him as he reached the door and returned the mace to the sergeant-at-arms, its official custodian, who with the speaker, was the only man who remained unmoved in a chamber seething with excitement.

All eyes then turned on the speaker to see what action he would take in this unheard of emergency. He rose to the occasion as the house always expects its speaker to do, gravely pronouncing the time honored form "I name the honorable member of Peckham for disorderly conduct."

Whereupon the suspension of Beckett was duly moved by Premier MacDonald and carried.

Beckett is the member who recently married a woman of the name of Belvoir, over the historic blacksmith's anvil at Gretna Green.

On leaving the chamber the two suspended members walked into the palace yard where they were escorted by a police inspector until they reached the gate marking the limits of the parliamentary precincts.

Suspension under rules of parliament will prevent the members from sitting in commons again until next Thursday.

The mace that Beckett absconded with is the symbol of the authority of the speaker of the house and is confided to him by the king himself.

In reality it is only lent the speaker, for the king resumes possession of it when parliament is prorogued. It is of silver-gilt and is four feet ten inches long and weighs 14 pounds.

PACT PROPONENTS THREATEN CLOTURE

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—Exasperated by the refusal of the London treaty opponents to agree to limit debate beginning next week, senate leaders decided today to try to exhaust discussions by night sessions and as a final resort to employ the cloture rule shutting off talk.

Senator Johnson, republican, California, leader of the opposition, rejected a proposal to limit debate beginning next Tuesday and called for a fight "without quarter."

Senator Watson of Indiana, the republican leader, who sought the agreement, answered by drawing from his pocket a petition to invoke the cloture rule. It was quickly signed by votes as many as the necessary 16 members.

It was withheld tonight, however, as leaders sought either to exhaust debate or to reach an agreement. Another attempt will be made tomorrow looking to limitation of debate.

Senator F. Reed, republican, Pennsylvania, gave notice at adjournment that he would move to keep the senate in session to-morrow night if the agreement was not forthcoming. An earlier plan to hold a session tonight was abandoned after a series of conferences.

that many stores or stations or places in 1929, each having sales of \$500 or more. And that Salem had last year 68 manufacturers turning out \$5000 worth or more each of articles.

This work is being carried on without clerical help, all such helpers having been paid off or vouchered. Nevertheless, the office will be kept open until this work and a lot of other cleaning up is finished, though no one will set any pay for it.

Only Wednesday of this week, the enumeration of a 190 acre dairy farm near Salem was completed and forwarded, adding also five to Marion county's population. This was missed by the regular enumerator who called that way in early April, on account of a misunderstanding of the precinct lines; one of the many cases in this district that caused extra trouble and work.

The operation of school buses in this county will cost about \$24,000 for the year, the board of school directors pay \$24,000 of this amount, and the county has come from other counties approximately \$10,000 which will be distributed as follows: Polk, \$3,559.50; Lane county, \$1,910.01 and Clatsop, \$4,530.49. Mills will be sent to the other counties immediately.

The transportation has been allowed at the rate of \$40 per capita for students attending school full time, and prorated for those who went only part of the time. The same basis will be continued next year, reports Mrs. Mary L. Fulkerson, county school superintendent, in view of the fact that there may be a change in the matter after the next legislative session.

SCHOOL BUSES ADD TO TAXES

Transportation and Tuition Cost 5.7 Mills Against 3.6 Mills Years Ago

This money, though not necessary, will be paid immediately to accommodate the bus operators.
