

Sheep Buyers Here Warned Against Stock From South

SPIRAL BURR CAUSES ALARM

Sheep Industry of Willamette Valley Threatened By Pest

"The most serious menace to the wool industry in the Willamette valley" is the way local wool buyers characterize the Clover Burr or Spiral Burr, which is prevalent in southern Oregon and California.

This burr lodges in the fleece and can be removed only by the process known as carbonizing which costs about six cents per pound. Any wool containing these burrs is docked five and six cents per pound by buyers.

Experts believe that sheep have carried the seeds of this burr from northern California into southern Oregon and grave fear is felt that the pest may spread to the Willamette valley. At this season of the year many sheep breeders are buying more ewes and in former years some have gone to southern Oregon for the stock. Wool buyers are warning sheep breeders that there is very grave danger of the sheep from southern Oregon and California carrying the seeds of these burrs and thus infecting the whole valley. Buyers agree that they can not over emphasize the damage to be done to the wool industry of the valley should these burrs get started here and every sheep buyer is urged to be very careful in buying stock from the infected areas.

MRS. WILLIAMS LEAVES Gold Star Mother Now on Her Way to France WOODBURN HAS ONE

WOODBURN, July 17.—Mrs. Kate S. Williams of Woodburn realized one of her highest ambitions, when she departed Wednesday for France where she will visit the grave of her eldest son, who was killed in action in the World war. She is the only Woodburn woman going on the trip.

Mrs. Williams, who lives in a modest little home just west of the Woodburn arch, left here Wednesday at 6:35 p. m. for a transcontinental trip to New York, which will last about five days. Other gold star mothers and widows will be picked up on the way. At New York the women will rest for one day and then depart on the S. S. George Washington for Cherbourg, France. The ocean trip will consume eight days and the entire trip will cover a period of five or six weeks.

Has Gold Star Medal
Mrs. Williams has already received her beautiful gold star medal which she is to wear in sight during the entire trip. It has her name embossed on the pin and the medallion contains every emblem of our nation. It bears the inscription "Pilgrimage of Mothers and Widows." Not to be caught unprepared, Mrs. Williams is learning French. She has a book like the ones distributed to the soldiers during the war.

Woodburn's gold star mother is going to France to see the grave of her son, Harry A. Lee, who was killed in action at one of the battles of Chateau Thierry. This engagement broke the Hindenburg line and marked the turning point of the war. Lee enlisted in Houston, Texas, and served as a private in Company H, 68th infantry, fourth division.

Has Prized Picture
One of Mrs. Williams' most prized possessions is the last picture of her son, which is framed by moss and heather from his grave. The moss and heather were brought to Mrs. Williams by a friend who visited France. Mrs. Williams' regret is that she does not have a picture of her son in uniform.
