PLANES COMING HERE AUGUST 3

Plans For Tour Discussed in Portland Friday; 50 in Caravan

PORTLAND, Ore., July 18.—(AP)—Fifty or more airplanes will take off from Vancouver, Wash., July 29 for a ten day tour of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, with stops at numerous airports.

Russell Lawson, vice president of the National Aeronautical association, under whose auspices the tour has been arranged, said today and hour and a half will be required for the planes to land and another hour and a half for them to take off at each airport. Two stops will be made each day. The first planes to appear at each city will be those carrying the parachute jumpers who will entertain the spectators before the flight group arrives. While the planes are on the field for inspection stunt pilots will perform in the air.

Delegates from the cities to be visited today elected Dave Legg, manager of Boeing field, Seattle, president of the Pacific Northwest Air Tour association. Curtis L. Hill, Tacoma was named vice-president.

The itinerary includes: August 1, La Grande and Baker; August 2, Pendleton and Portland; August 3, Tillamook and Salem; August 4, Springfield and Medford; August 5, Silverton and Coquille.

TWO RIDING RODS KILLED IN WRECK

TRINIDAD, Colo., July 18.—(AP)—Victims of an attempt to wreck a Colorado and Southern train here last night, Pete Lee and Carl Blunck died today of injuries received when the train was partially derailed and the car on which they were "bumming" a ride was thrown 50 feet.

The wreck occurred at Paducah, Texas, and Blunck from Clinton, Okla. Passengers were shaken up and minor injuries were received by members of the train crew.

R. C. Gowdy, Denver, chief engineer of the C. & S., said an investigation disclosed the wreck was the result of a malicious attempt to wreck the train.

A rail length had been removed and the rest of the track, he said, was in perfect condition. Lee lost a foot and his leg was broken. Shock and loss of blood caused death. Blunck was injured internally.

Dan Horan, Trinidad, escaped death narrowly when the locomotive tipped on its right side.

ED GILLINGHAM HAS SAID "GOOD-MORNING" TO JUDGE FOR AT LEAST 25 YEARS

Yet This Quiet and Efficient Librarian Has Never Been Lodged in Jail

There is a man in Salem who for the past 25 years has averaged a "good morning, judge," every day of that time, and still has never spent a day in jail, nor paid a cent in fines. That man is Edward N. Gillingham, "Ed" to hundreds of men all over Oregon, and librarian of the state supreme court library.

Mr. Gillingham was born in Salem a number of years ago, the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. N. Gillingham, pioneers of the Willamette valley. Mrs. Gillingham, Sr., before her marriage was Eugenia Wariner, who crossed the plains in 1853 with her parents, and settled with them in the old Bethel colony, where her father was one of the first, if not the first, Negro physician in Oregon. Not only was he a physician but he was greatly interested in the college which was at that time located in Bethel and were such makers of Oregon legal history as Judge H. J. Bean, Charles Wolverton, W. D. Fenton, and Judge George H. Burnett were graduated in those early days.

Educated Socially Mr. Gillingham attended school in Salem, took work at the Capitol Business college, and while there was appointed bailiff of the supreme court. After taking this position, Mr. Gillingham began the study of law in Willamette university and graduated from this school.

During the past 25 years of service Mr. Gillingham has seen the library change from its location in the south wing of the third floor of the state house to its present location on the second floor of the supreme court building.

KELLOGG PACT UP AT LONDON PARLEY

LONDON, July 18.—(AP)—Three American congressmen today took a prominent part in discussions of the Kellogg pact at the fifth session of the inter-parliamentary union conference.

Representatives Morton D. Hull, of Chicago, Fiorella H. La Guardia, of New York, and Burton L. French of Idaho, put their views before the delegates expressing the opinions of widely separated American constituencies.

The Chicagoan opened the discussion with the statement that re-examination of the treaty was needed with a view to securing international cooperation to prevent war. He said that war anywhere is the concern of all and that in such a community of interest there should be a logical community of effort to prevent war.

Representative La Guardia told the parliamentarians that peace work could not be left to professional diplomats but must be undertaken by each citizen of every country.

Pop Gates Not One to Decline If Job Offered

C. E. (Pop) Gates of Medford, member of the state highway commission, spent Friday in Salem conferring with Governor Norblad and other state officials.

Gates has been mentioned prominently in connection with the nomination for governor to succeed the late George W. Joseph of Portland. Although Gates said he was not an active candidate for the nomination, he would not be adverse to accepting the honor in case "lightning struck in Southern Oregon."

The nomination will be made at a meeting of the republican state central committee to be held in Portland next Friday.

Morse's Parole Revoked After Law Violation

Governor Norblad Friday revoked the parole granted to Fred Morse, who was released from the state penitentiary here July 25, two year sentence for burglary committed in Lane county.

Since receiving the parole Morse has served a term in the Lane county jail for possession of liquor. Governor Norblad said he would be required to serve an additional 14 months in the penitentiary.
