HOWITZER COMPANY AIDS DEDICATION

WOODBURN, July 19.—One platoon of the Woodburn howitzer company, Oregon National guard, left early Saturday morning for the new Salmon river cutoff, where it will take a major part in the dedication ceremonies.

The platoon left early in order to be in position when the governor's party arrives, to give the governor's salute of 17 guns. Two regimental bands are also scheduled to take part.

Captain Oliver S. Olsen, of Woodburn made the trip through the Salmon river cutoff last week and reports that the road will be a wonderful and worthwhile improvement when it is finished, but is quite rough in spots at present. The new road will make a shorter and more direct route to the coast resorts, cutting 26 miles from the distance from Portland to Newport.
