IRRIGATING HOLLY IS NEW EXPERIMENT

ZENA, July 26. — Mr. and Mrs. J. F. McKinley and children, Evangeline, Phillip, George and Elbert of Salem spent Wednesday at McKinley orchard at Zena.

Mr. McKinley is experimenting a little with his fine holly orchard here by irrigating it. Wednesday he was thinning the pears in his pear orchard, the crop being unusually heavy. Mr. McKinley had charge of the cherry orchard of his brother, A. F. McKinley of Los Angeles this year as he was teaching and unable to be here as in former years.

The cherry crop was heavier than usual. Sorters were employed for a time, but later McKinley paid the pickers 2 cents, a half cent more than most orchardists paid and each picker sorted his cherries at the tree.

BROOKS GROUP BACK HOME

BROOKS, July 26 — Rev. and Mrs. George Cole and Mrs. Cole's mother, Mrs. J. S. Dunlavy, have returned home from a two weeks' vacation spent in Oroville, Calif., guests at the country home of Mr. Cole's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Cole and family.

Leaving Jefferson July 7 they reached the summit of the Siskiyou mountains early Tuesday morning, the highest point on the Pacific highway, elevation 4,516 feet. On entering California all cars were placed under strict quarantine, which routine took about 45 minutes. Next was the lovely view of Mt. Shasta, Black Butte, Mt. Pitt and Mt. Lassen, the most recent volcano in the United States. Arriving in Oroville late Tuesday evening, they spent the night as guests of Rev. and Mrs. Horace Allen, driving out to the country home of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Cole Wednesday morning.

The party made the trip by auto and report the roads in excellent condition, even the detours being paved. Many places of interest were visited, among them Bidwell Bar, in Butte county, where stands the mother orange tree of California, planted by Judge Joseph in 1856. The tree is eight feet around and casts a shadow 45 feet in diameter at the noon hour. They also viewed a huge gold dredger, located about 20 miles south of Oroville.

Rev. and Mrs. George Cole, Mrs. J. S. Dunlavy and Mrs. E. W. Cole motored to Sacramento, a distance of about 90 miles from Oroville, and spent the day. While there they visited Fort Sutter, located in the eastern part of the city of Sacramento, where Capt. John A. Sutter built his first protection against the Indians in 1839. Many relics of pioneer days the preserved at this fort.

State Capitol Visited They also visited the state capitol grounds, which consist of about 35 acres of beautiful park, with its palm trees, weeping cy-

press, cork bark elm, white mulberry and magnolia and many other different trees and plants which have been transplanted from every continent and climate.

A portion of the park, known as the G. A. R., grove composed of trees from all the principal battle fields of the Civil war, was collected, as saplings transplanted from the battle fields, and dedicated to the memory of Civil war veterans. This was of especial interest to Mrs. Dunlavy, her father being a Civil war veteran. Among them were red maple from the battle field at Gettysburg, Pa., which was fought July 13, 1863; Montezuma cypress tree from Balls Bluff, Va., 1861; cedar elm tree, battle of Bull Run, Va.; pencil cedar tree from battle ground of Cold Harbor, Va., 1864; white ash tree, battle of Vicksburg, Miss.; scarlet maple, battle of Atlanta, Georgia in 1864; and many others. Sacramento state capitol's corner stone was laid in 1861. Sacramento, "the capitol city" is the largest and chief shipping point in the Sacramento valley.

From Sacramento the party went to Stockton, Calif., a distance of about 65 miles, where they were guests over night of Mr. and Mrs. Guidor, and Edward and Edith Schurr, the latter being a nephew and niece of Rev. George Cole. They also visited Mrs. Thelma Roberts before returning to Oroville.

Rev. and Mrs. George Cole and Mrs. Dunlavy visited Mrs. Briggs at her farm home near Durham. Mrs. Briggs and her two sons have 40 acres of almonds which are ready to harvest. They also visited at the "Seven Oaks farm" the old home of the E. W. Cole family near Corning. Near Corning they viewed the largest fig tree in the state of California.

They also viewed many lovely orange orchards, olive orchards, apricot orchards, walnut, almond and many other kinds of fruit orchards in the irrigated district.

Payment of taxes in monthly installments is being agitated in North Carolina.

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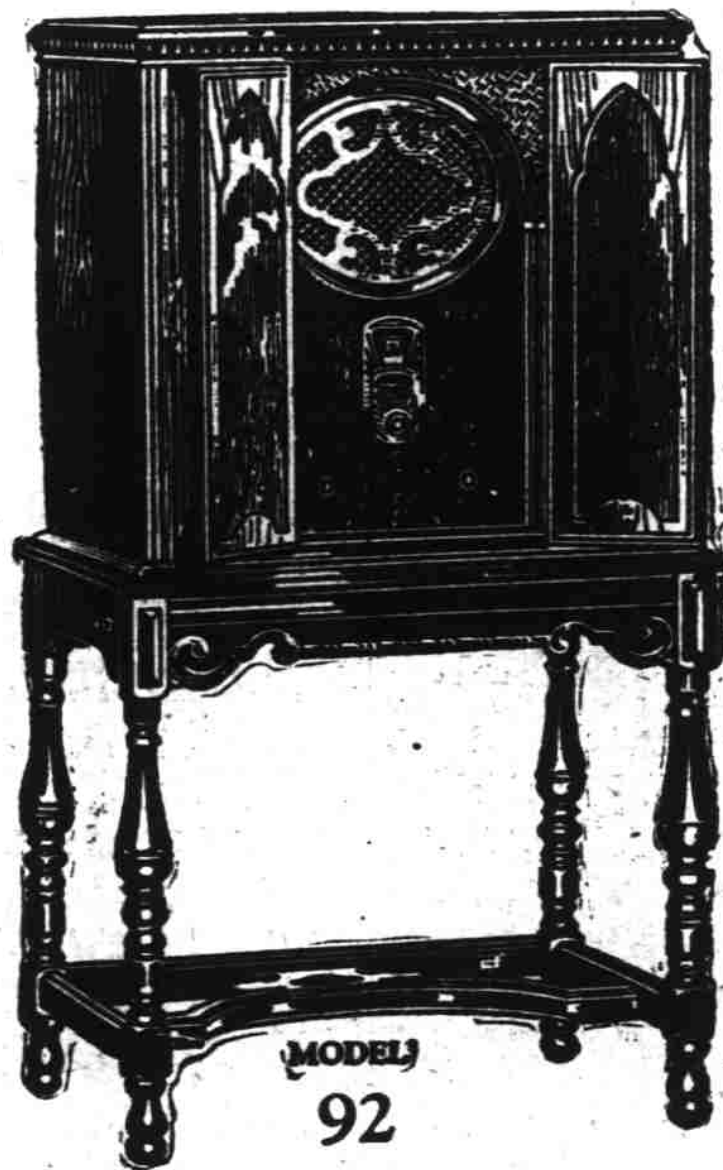
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
