the bulk of the new crop in hopes

of a better market later in the Recent drought and extremely high temperatures in the Central western states has caused considerable damage to pastures, forage and feed crop and has been large-ly responsible for a slowing up of hipments of alfalfa hay from that section. Growers are inclined to hold more than usual amounts for their own use in expectation of higher prices.

Quotations remained unchanged during the week in Portland with U. S. No. 1 quoted to the trade at \$17.50 per ton. F. O. B. quotations in the Hermiston district were around \$12.50 per ton and one dollar lower in the Yakima valley. Offerings were heavier in Pertland but the buying continued for immediate requirements only.

Pastures in the northwest are generally good and supplies of local hay abundant. Movement of alfalfa at Seattle continued small with quotations nominal. Demand at Portland was confined almost entirely to the top grades to supply small dealers and rab-

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
