

RUSSIAN PULPWOOD CASE DRAWS FIRE

WASHINGTON, July 30—(AP)—Efforts to have the treasury set aside its order prohibiting importation of pulpwood from Russia or delay its enforcement for 90 days were made by representatives of ship owners, ship charterers, paper manufacturers and a labor organization in a hearing conducted by Assistant Secretary Lowman.

At conclusion, Lowman said he would consider the protests and make a decision within two days.

The shipping representatives told the treasury official unless the order was at least set aside they would face huge losses and said they had accepted the pulpwood freight in good faith without thought its importation was barred by law.

Lowman repudiated importation of any product produced in whole or in part by convict labor had been prohibited since 1890 and that the ship owners and charterers were presumed to have been acquainted with the law.

The other representatives argued convict labor had not entered into the production of the pulpwood and it was a duty of the government to prove it had if the product were to be barred.
