

Labish Celery Crop Estimated at 650 Cars This Summer

VEGETABLES OF FINE QUALITY

Labish Growers Shipping Celery and Lettuce Daily

HAZEL GREEN, July 30—The Lake Labish Celery union has already shipped out 20 cars of celery and seven cars of lettuce this season, according to reports from the association office.

The celery and lettuce go to all parts of the United States and recently a small shipment was sent to Japan.

The second planting of lettuce is now being cut and is of unusually fine quality, according to the growers.

It is estimated that the celery shipments will total 650 cars this season. The peak of the celery season is reached about Thanksgiving time but the cuttings now are of very fine quality and the bunches are unusually large for this season of the year.

Potatoes of Fine Quality Declares Portland Inspector

The potato inspector in the Portland field says that the potatoes on the early truck markets are of a quality much superior to those of previous seasons and he believes that the new standardization law is to be credited largely for the improvement.

The greater part of the stock at present is sold as U. S. No. 2, but as the season advances, U. S. No. 1 will predominate. Dealers who are exposed their potatoes to sunlight are warned that a short time in such direct exposure will cause them to turn green and deteriorate in quality. Potatoes less than 1 1/2 inches in diameter must be marked as "Oregon Culls," and not "Oregon No. 2."

The potato inspector invites consultation of growers and dealers regarding the law and regulations governing grading and marking. He can be reached through Atwater 4675 and Walnut 9288, Portland.

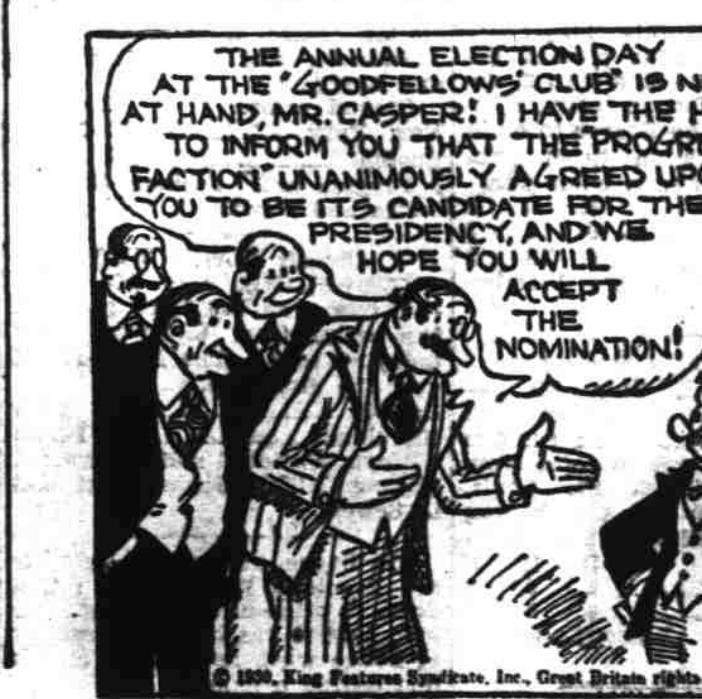

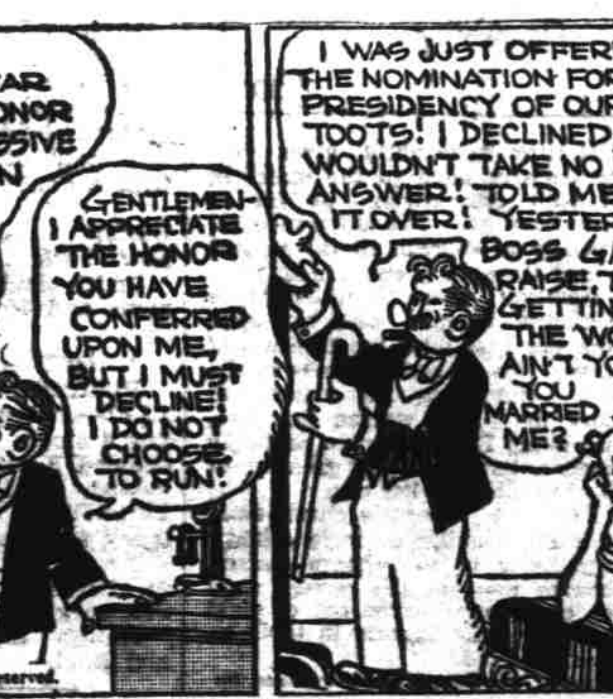
