

Salem Out to Win Honors in National Health Contest

PARENTS' HELP IS REQUESTED

Vaccination Against Smallpox, Diphtheria, Large Point in Score

Due to the extended health program of five years put on by the Marion County Health Unit, the present work of the Marion County Health Unit, Salem is in position to make a high scoring in the health contest to be put on this year for health by cities of from 20,000 to 50,000.

The contest is sponsored by the United States chamber of commerce and the Salem chamber and the Marion County Health Unit will cooperate in working for a high health score for Salem.

White Plains, New York, a city about the size of Salem, was given first award last year for its health program. Yet Salem, with the start it has made, already has a record equal if not superior to that city, according to our health records.

Early Care Urged
Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, city health officer, is urging mothers to have their children of pre-school age vaccinated for smallpox and immunized against diphtheria during the summer months before the rush of the school period.

In a survey recently made of the elementary grades in the Salem schools, the record shows that 1176 pupils had been vaccinated, fully 53 per cent of all pupils in the grades. And 1195 pupils in the grade schools had been given the toxin anti-toxin treatment for diphtheria. This is about 55 per cent.

Last year, White Plains, New York, the winning city for health work in the Salem class, won on a showing of 40 per cent of all children under five years of age being immunized against diphtheria and 65 per cent vaccinated against smallpox.

Salem will compete with this city in the health contest this year and it will become necessary for our city to make a much better showing in vaccination of grade pupils.

Hence Dr. Douglas is urging mothers to bring their children to 434 North High street, headquarters for the Marion County Health Unit, and have proper health examinations made, or to have mothers consult their own family physicians.

100 Per Cent Job Aired
Dr. Douglas says Salem should show a record of almost 100 per cent vaccinations of school children and 75 per cent for toxin anti-toxin treatment against diphtheria if Salem is to enter the contest with a good chance of winning.

Other matters that enter into the contest in which Salem will make a creditable showing is water supply, sewerage and disposal of garbage.

The chamber of commerce is cooperating with Dr. Douglas as it believes Salem is in position to make a scoring that entitles it to recognition as one of the most health cities in the country.

\$300,000 Sought to Handle Big 1930 Flax Crop

Hai Ross, secretary of state, Wednesday called a meeting of the state emergency board to be held here Monday to authorize a deficiency appropriation of \$300,000 to cover the cost of this year's flax crop under contract by the state.

Flax is now arriving at the state penitentiary and officials said the crop this year is the largest in the history of the state and the quality is above normal. The state has about 1500 acres under contract.

BUDGET OUTGO HELD REGULAR

City Funds Half Gone at End of 7 Months; Bond Cost Leads Others

The city of Salem has expended virtually one-half of its budget allowances up to July 31, according to a report presented by City Recorder Paulsen to the council this week. The budget agreed upon for 1930 totals \$428,126 and disbursements up to the end of last month amounted to \$214,266 with balances on hand amounting to \$213,859.

In almost all of the 33 items listed in the city's budget outgo had proceeded at a regular monthly scale, with seven-twelfths of the moneys in the treasury now gone. This did not apply to the installments and interests on sewer bonds where the heavy payments come at the beginning of the year. Of the \$28,800 allowed on this item, \$26,400 has been disbursed.

The principal items in the city's 1930 budget are: Salaries police department, \$30,900; salaries fire department, \$36,600; lighting expense, \$29,000; sweeping and cleaning department, \$14,498; installment and interest on general obligation bonds, \$34,770; redemption street bonds, \$27,302; fire department tax fund, \$35,000; street repair tax fund, \$35,000.

NEW ASSESSMENT POLICY TRIED OUT

Charles V. Galloway, member of the state tax commission who is in charge of tax equalization, said yesterday the commission's building survey, which ultimately will reach every building in Oregon, is now in progress in nine counties. They are Klamath, Jackson, Josephine, Lane, Clackamas, Clatsop, Yamhill, Wasco and Multnomah.

Galloway said that the work will be extended to other counties this year. The work is being done through the county assessor's offices under the supervision of the state commission. The state has started the work first in those counties where the assessors were best equipped to cooperate. Completion of the work will not be accomplished for several years.

New Job Is Put up for Mr. Small

Justice Brainer Small, in addition to the duties of administering fines and sentences and such avocational pursuits as managing air tour caravans, had a new assignment dropped on his desk this week.

The job is that of bill collector. A Sunnyside, Wash., woman in a letter to the justice complains that a certain Salem individual left a four-dollar room charge unpaid.

"Grab her clothes before she leaves town," the complainant and prospective client writes Small. "She sure has plenty of them and good ones to. All costs of the transaction will have to be stood by her for I have repeatedly told her what would happen if she did not pay."

The letter to Small is concluded by the statement "We'll take our four dollars out in clothes and she'll find that even if I am Irish, I'm not so good natured, that is after sweating over a hot stove for a month."

The justice replied in his letter this week that he was not in the collection business and could not attach the property of the alleged bill-jumper but added he hoped the Irish temper of his Sunnyside protestant would cool by the time fall arrived.

HOLMAN WANTED; 'MEIER IS UNFIT'

From Jail, Stallard Puts His Taboo on Julius' Own Candidacy

From his cell in the city jail H. H. Stallard, candidate for U. S. senator on an independent ticket, Wednesday made public a statement in which he says Rufus Holman is the logical man to lead the Joseph forces. A reform movement led by Julius Meier would be "so ridiculous as to be laughable if it wasn't so serious," he states.

Stallard, a "martyr" to the cause of freedom of speech and assembly, has been a staunch supporter of the Joseph policies, but has branded Meier as a hypocrite in previous statements. "The monkey that politicians are making of Mr. Meier would not concern me in the least if it did not carry with it the defeat of the very thing that the progressives want—better government. Mr. Meier could not cut loose from the politicians who are managing his campaign any more than the republican or democratic candidate can from their supporters," he declares.

Regarding Holman, the letter says, "There is only one man to lead the Joseph forces and that man is Rufus Holman. Around Holman we can build a strong progressive movement that if it does not win now can go on in the future."

Stallard was jailed when he refused to pay a fine of \$25 last week, choosing to be a "martyr" to the free speech cause by serving his fine out in jail. He was arrested Saturday night, July 30, when he delivered a campaign speech on a downtown street corner.

MARKET GROUP IS NOT YET NAMED

Livesley Says Vandevort Should Act; Latter Wants Head Job

Action on the public market situation was still "up in the air" with no committee appointed for investigation of the proposition late Wednesday night. A misunderstanding as to who has authority to appoint such a committee between H. H. Vandevort, chairman of the committee on committees,

and Mayor T. A. Livesley was responsible for the delay.

Livesley contended that the committee should appoint the public market committee, while Vandevort thought it was the mayor's duty.

Vandevort, who introduced the resolution providing for a public market, stated Wednesday he would like to have something to say as to who should be on the committee, and in case the mayor should appoint the special committee that he hoped to get the chairmanship.

The committee will be appointed to investigate the feasibility of establishing a public market for disposal of farmers' produce. If the report should be found favorable, it is believed the city budget for 1931 will provide for such a market.
