

FLORIDA FOLK SEE CHAMPOEG

Visitors Prove to Be Related
To Dr. Floyd Who Gave
Oregon Its Name

CHAMPOEG, August 6.—Mr. and Mrs. N. Floyd Holmes and small sons, N. Floyd Jr. and Henry Henden Holmes of Ft. Pierce, Florida, visited at the park Monday and it was revealed to Mrs. Weathered and Mr. Tozier that Mr. Holmes is a great great grandson of Dr. John Floyd who, while a congressman from Virginia, gave Oregon its official name in congress.

Dr. John Floyd was twice governor of Virginia and the last governor under the old Virginia constitution and the first under the new constitution in addition to his services in the congress of the United States. His son, John B., was also governor of Virginia and served as secretary of war under the administration of President Buchanan. John B. Floyd was a distant relative of President Buchanan and his name is on file in the records of the confederacy as General Floyd in the Civil war.

Grave Rudely Marked
Until two years ago the grave of Dr. John Floyd was unmarked with nothing but a small tombstone in a badly run down cemetery in Virginia. Recently his granddaughter, Miss Lettie Floyd Holmes of Charlottesville, Virginia, then 31, erected a monument and the old cemetery called Sweet Springs, West Virginia is being restored.

The Holmes left their home in Florida July and drove west via the southern route visiting all the scenic points of interest. They will embark from Seattle the latter part of this week for a week in Alaska and expect to return home through Glacier national park and Yellowstone, arriving in Florida in September.
