Frank Roeser carried the mail on route 2 Wednesday in the absence of M. J. Mahoney, the regular carrier.

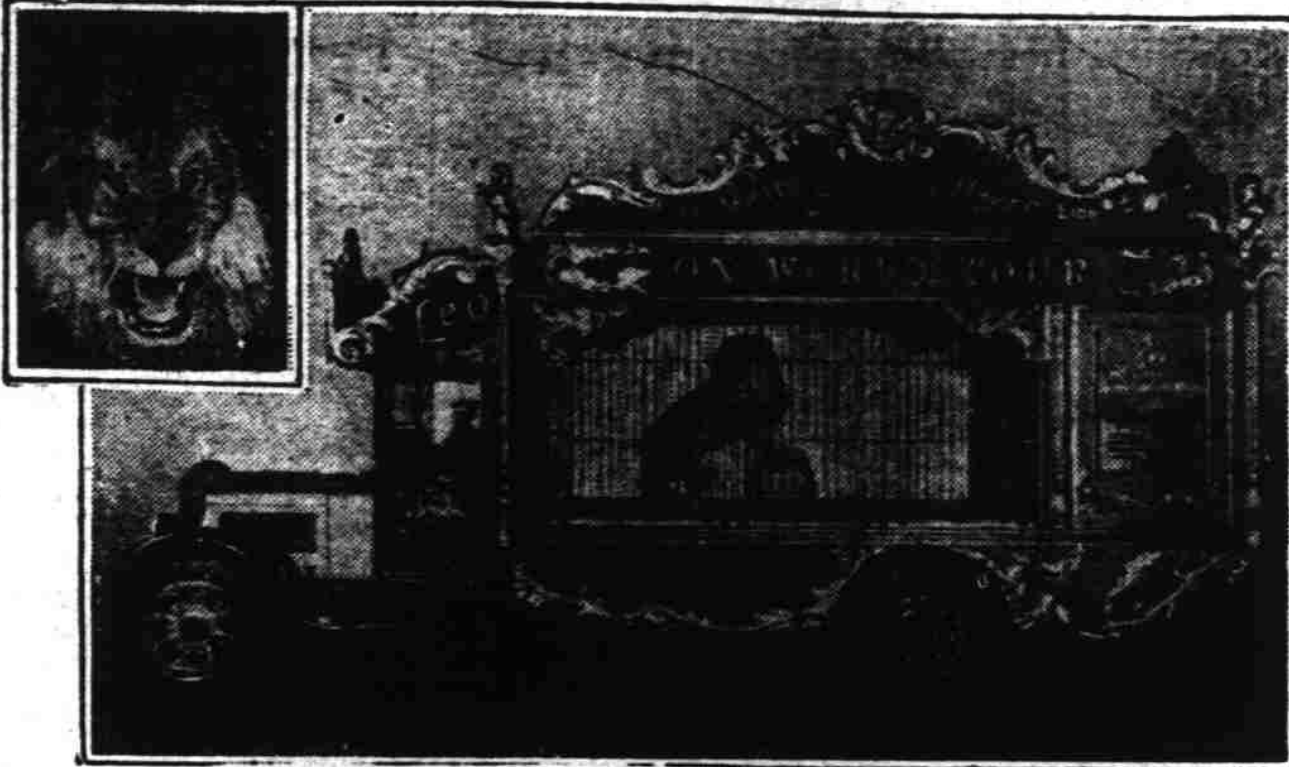
Walter Wadsworth returned this week to his work in Salem after having assisted at the bank during the absence of Misses Helen Hiller and Fern Wadsworth in California.
