STOCK JUDGING TOUR PLANNED

Third Such 4-H Club Event Of Season Scheduled For Saturday

The third boys' and girls' 4-H club livestock judging tour, of the season will be held Saturday, with club members from Marion, Polk and Clackamas counties participating. At least 40 are expected to attend. Written and radio invitations have also been extended to club boys and girls from Multnomah, Washington, Linn, Lane and other counties to attend.

Dairy cattle only will be judged on this tour, herds of Guernsey, Jersey and Holstein breeds to be visited. The youthful judges will gather in sections, the Polk county delegation to meet at the Marion county court house at 8:45 o'clock Saturday morning, then to proceed to Silverton where it will join with the Marion and Clackamas county delegations at the Coe-Hodge and McClellan bank at 9:20 o'clock.

In the morning the group will judge classes of Guernseys on the Rudolph Stadel ranch, three miles southwest of Silverton and near the Evergreen school. This work will start at 9:30 o'clock. The schedule calls for judging of the prize winning Jerseys on the M. G. Gunderson farm on the Silverton-Mt. Angel highway, beginning at 10:30 o'clock. A picnic lunch will be held at noon at Silver Creek, each club member to bring his own basket.

Judge Holsteins in the Afternoon
The afternoon will be devoted to judging Holsteins at the Mt. Angel dairy, a half-day being devoted to this breed by special request.

Scores made by the club members on this tour will count toward selection of the Marion county team to enter competition at the state fair this fall.

In charge of the judging tour Saturday will be W. W. Fox, Marion county club agent, J. R. Beck, Polk county agent and county jail.
