

NEW DEAL FOR TRAFFIC SQUAD

Rafferty's Successor to Be Man of Military Experience, Announced

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In Portland, nor Frank Hoss at the head of the Portland traffic department, are being considered by Hoss for Rafferty's job.

Will Be Man of Military Experience

Hoss announced that the new chief of the state traffic department would be a man who has had military experience, and is well equipped to carry on an educational program in connection with traffic problems. The new officer has not had previous police experience. Hoss said this was an advantage rather than a disadvantage, for the reason that traffic officers are not dealing with criminals.

Reports that McMahon had spent considerable time at Hoss' home, and had carried tales to the state traffic department with the operations of Chief Rafferty and certain other members of the state traffic department were denied emphatically by the secretary of state.

"I want it understood," said Hoss, "that McMahon has not visited my beach home during the last two years, and I never at any time had any intention of appointing him as a successor to Rafferty."

Not Given Free Hand in Affairs

When asked if Rafferty had been given a free hand in the operation of the state traffic department, and had authority to discharge his subordinates in an effort to reestablish discipline, Hoss said he had not.

"Such a course," Hoss declared, "might have resulted in the discharge of several men who have proved valuable to the state traffic department."

Hoss said there were at least two cliques in the state traffic department. One of these cliques leaned toward Rafferty and the other toward Hoss. Hoss declared, while the other was scattered through the department but had no apparent leader. Hoss denied that McMahon had exerted any influence with the clique opposed to Rafferty and his system of conducting the state traffic division.

Rafferty's successor probably will enter the employ of the state as a patrolman early in September, and a few days later will be promoted to the office of chief of the traffic department. The law provides that chiefs of the department must be promoted from the ranks, and cannot be employed from outside the traffic division.

Will Go Through State Legislature

Preceding the date of his employment as chief of the traffic department, Rafferty's successor will confer with traffic officials in Washington and California, and later will motor through Oregon in the role of a tourist. Hoss said this would give him a general idea of conditions in the state, and make it possible for him to visit the various traffic divisions.

At the next legislative session, Hoss intimated that he would request the elimination of captains, lieutenants and sergeants in the state traffic department. Hoss said this would remove confusion, and place the new chief squarely in charge of his subordinates.

The ouster of Captain Kenneth Bloom, stationed at Albany, also will occur on October 1, according to announcement made by Hoss.

MEN IN MAJORITY ENTERING AT W. U.

Cedes Will Be Outnumbered For First Time Since 1920, Indicated

For the first time since the war, the number of men entering Willamette university at the beginning of the fall term will outnumber the women. Out of 241 applications already accepted there are 144 men and 97 women, figures released Monday from the office of the registrar show.

In the total number of applications there are 16 college transfers; the rest are entering the freshman class. Total registration in the liberal arts department alone for last year was 167, 88 women and 79 men. Although the policy of the institution has always been to keep enrollment under the 500 mark, last year there were 513 enrolled in the three departments, law, music and liberal arts. This year promises to be a further breach of policy. The number of applications accepted to date is 14 per cent greater than total enrollment last year.

Forty of the new students are from outside states, and four foreign countries, China, Japan, Russia and Switzerland, are represented in the enrollment for next year.

Willamette's success in athletics and the enlargement of the department of economics to a complete major are believed to be the principal causes responsible for the influx of men for the next school year.
