

STUDY IS MADE OF IRRIGATION

First Tour of Kind in This County Set Next Monday Doerfler Announces

Marion county's first irrigation tour was announced Tuesday by Frank Doerfler for Monday, August 25, when 10 to 12 of the leading farm irrigation projects in the county will be viewed by any farmers or other citizens interested in this phase of agricultural work. Doerfler will conduct the tour under the auspices of the "First National" bank where he heads the agricultural department.

The tour starts promptly at 8:30 a. m. at the bank. Carl Vogt's place at Pratum will be the first visited. Here irrigation from a deep well will be viewed. The itinerary then calls for an inspection of Doerfler's own farm where a gravity irrigation system brings water from Pudding river through 1800 feet of pipe interspersed with hydrants at 200-foot intervals. In another system a 500-foot pipe line is connected with a 12-foot standpipe to lift water to higher points.

Crops raised by Doerfler include carrots, beans, mint and potatoes.

Luncheon to be in Salem, Wood.

Luncheon will be served at noon in Salem. Doerfler expects that if the guests are not "too numerous" he will be host.

After lunch the Patterson and Gilbert farm will be visited where the irrigation system used on ladino clover and on alfalfa is to be viewed. The party is then to go to the Lakebrook hop area and see the use of irrigation in hop growing.

At the William McGilchrist place north of Salem, irrigation in potato growing is to be studied and at the Sari Brown farm near Gervais, 40 acres of evergreen blackberries as well as cucumber, filbert and loganberry irrigation will be seen.

The development of irrigation in the valley and its importance to the future of crops here, makes Doerfler anticipate a large attendance of farmers on the tour.

HOOVER PASSES UP WESTERN JOURNEY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—(AP)—President Hoover applied the blue pencil to his vacation itinerary again today and the plans for a western trip vanished. The task of hearing another great relief work behind which the chief executive is throwing the pressure of the federal government to aid drought sufferers was assigned as the reason for curtailing his vacation plans for a second time.

Early in May the chief executive made known that he expected to tour five national parks and visit his home at Palo Alto, California. Prolongation of the session of the congress upset his plans after he had received scores of invitations to visit all parts of the west and had been urged by some close political advisers to forego the jaunt.

Plans for the trip were considerably curtailed, but it was said last month at the White House the president still expected to be able to spend at least two weeks in Glacier and Yellowstone parks. Since then other factors have entered into the situation with the drought finally forcing definite abandonment of such a trip in the immediate future.

Weekly trips to his lodge in the Virginia mountains are expected to be his summer diversion, as in this manner he can maintain close touch with official business.

BEN RICKLI GOING TO BERKELEY Y. M.

Ben Rickli, assistant secretary of the Salem Y. M. C. A. for over four years, will leave soon for Berkeley, Calif., where he has accepted a position as assistant general secretary in charge of Y. M. C. A. promotion work. The change is in the nature of a promotion and Rickli will receive an increased salary.

Successor to Rickli will not be chosen immediately, the position to remain open for a time. Rickli has eight years experience in association work, having been a member of the Portland staff for four years following his graduation from Willamette university.

Irving Hale has been selected to take the position left vacant by Ben Rickli, who has been granted a teaching fellowship at the University of Washington where he will work for his master's degree in political science.

BARRICADED PAIR FINALLY GIVE UP

SEATTLE, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Two brothers, one wounded, who had barricaded themselves in the woods and defied arrest by seven deputy sheriffs after an affray with officers near Kent, surrendered today to free their women-folk who had been held as "hostages."

The two, Henry and Carl Breunmer, appeared voluntarily at the sheriff's office here. Sheriff Claude Bannick said numerous charges have been made against the Breunmer family, including possession of a still and kidnapping charges against Carl, one of three brothers.

The affray began last night with the visit of Auburn officers to arrest Carl on an assault complaint brought by a third brother Fred. Resistance was offered by both the men and women of the family and Henry, wounded twice by shots after he had fired upon the officers, escaped into the woods with Carl.

During the fighting, resident sheriff Claude Lathier said he was killed and beaten by three of the Breunmer women.

The two men hid themselves in the woods and for a time early today seven deputy sheriffs, some summoned from Seattle, surrounded the place. The affray was abandoned later and Margaret Breunmer and Mrs. Carl Breunmer were arrested by Sheriff Bannick and brought to Seattle as "hostages."

TUBERCULOSIS ON WANE HERE

Census Report Encouraging To State Association; Deaths Reduced

While the 1930 census indicates an encouraging increase in the state's population for the past decade, a decrease equally complimentary to the state is indicated in a report by the Oregon Tuberculosis association showing that despite the increase in the total population of the state, the number as well as the rate, or percentage of deaths from tuberculosis has actually decreased.

From 470 deaths in 1920 the number dropped to 504 in 1928 and apparently will be less than 500 for the 1929 while the state's population during the ten years has increased from 753,389 to nearly 1,000,000. This gives a reduction in the rate from 8.1 per 100,000 population in 1920 to 5.73 for 1928. The highest rate for the state was 95.3 in 1915, the year the state tuberculosis association was formed, and with the exception of one or two upward spurts, during the war and again following the influenza epidemic in 1923, the rate has been declining each year.

Oregon's rate compares favorably with that for the nation in general which in 1928 was 14.2 deaths for each 100,000 of the population and in 1928 was 7.9 and a fraction. Two Sanatoria. Vital Influence.

The establishment of the two state sanatoria at Salem and The Dalles for the treatment of tubercular patients has had a considerable influence on the reduction of the rate in Oregon, the association believes.

As tuberculosis is acquired through prolonged contact with a tubercular patient, provision of tubercular sanatoria by the state is an essential element in the ultimate eradication of the scourge. The national tuberculosis association with which the Oregon association is affiliated, estimates there are at least 3,000 active cases in Oregon at the present time, with less than a thousand of these under medical care.

"Spud" Slips; G. Spragg Gets Severe Leg Cut

JEFFERSON, Aug. 12.—Gilbert Spragg, who has been cutting wood at Pedee spent the weekend with his mother, Mrs. D. Spragg on Saturday. Gilbert had the misfortune to cut a gash six inches long on his leg, inside at the knee.

Gilbert was peeling bark off a tree with "spud" and it slipped causing him to cut his leg, making it necessary to see a physician. He will return to Pedee Monday evening.
