Schwab and Perrine Counted on for Mound Duty in Baker Series

The Silverton American Legion junior baseball team, with the championship of Oregon safely tucked under its collective belt, is on its way today to Baker, there to participate in the regional series for the northwest championship.

Teams from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana are listed for competition beginning Thursday at Baker, American Legion convention city this year. The winner will enter the western finals at Colorado Springs, Colo.

It is probable that Perrine, Parrish junior high school boy of Salem, will pitch one of the games in the tournament at Baker. If Silverton draws the Washington team first, Orville Schwab may pitch that game, otherwise he will be held for the Friday contest.

## Arthur and Barrackman To Try it Again Tonight With Rough Stuff "Out"

All those wrestling fans who were "crossed up" a week ago when Mervin Barrackman won from Ernie Arthur, may be vindicated tonight, or on the other hand they may learn definitely that they were wrong to begin with.

These tough middleweights will clash again, each seeking to edge the other out of a place near the top rank in the race for the new northwest belt. This time the rabbit punch, slapping and rough stuff in general will be barred.

Barrackman also is ordinarily a clean wrestler but is ready with the other kind when necessary and he apparently decried last Wednesday's match one of those occasions.

An "extra" on the card will be a boxing exhibition by the Ambrose twins, their second appearance of this nature. This will probably be an appetizer for the fight cards that are coming up soon according to Matchmaker Harry Plant. Teddy Fox is back in town after a successful invasion of the Philippines, and expected to be in shape for a main event within a few weeks.

## WORLD MILE MARK BY HILL ACCEPTED

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 12—(AP)—Alonso A. Stagg, chairman of the track and field meet committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association, today notified Bill Hayward, University of Oregon track coach, the mark established by Ralph Hill, University of Oregon miler, in defeating Rufus Kiser, University of Washington, last spring has been accepted as the world's inter-collegiate record. Hill's time was 4:12.4 for the mile run.

Hill's record was one fifth second better than established by Tabor of Georgetown at Cambridge, Mass., in 1915, and is said to be the fastest outdoor time ever made in this country. Joe May and Paavo Nurmi, however, both have bettered the mark by one fifth second in indoor meets.

Stagg advised Hayward to apply to the Amateur Athletic Union to have Hill's record recognized as the national mile record. Hayward immediately sent all data in regard to the mile run to Dan Farris, secretary treasurer of the A. A. U. at New York.

Hill, captain-elect of the 1931 Webfoot team, is eligible for one more year of collegiate competition. Next year, Hayward said, Hill will attempt to break the world's record of 4:10 made by Nurmi at Stockholm several years ago.

"In Jones and Carpenter, tackle, Spec Keene had two men who were much better than anyone else. Lang at fullback was another outstanding man. All these were big and had plenty of speed, so that they were most effective.

"Willamette was also fortunate in having some exceptionally fast men in the backfield, men who were very capable with the forward pass and excellent open field runners. In the latter respect, Erickson was especially capable. Undoubtedly Willamette had the best team the institution has had since 1905 and should have an even better team this year.

"Whitman, champion in the previous year, was runner-up around the veteran ends. Lindgren and Holmgren and the backfield stars, Reese, Council and Applegate. The team showed considerable strength on offense and was able to defeat all opponents up to the Thanksgiving day game with Willamette.
