This is the third case of diphtheria to be reported in the con ty in the last two weeks, which would show that the disease is increasing in spite of efforts to wipe it out. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, cuny health offcer, says that in view of the increase during the summer months, when disease is usually at low ebb, it will be well for everyone to take advantage of the toxin-antitoxin clinic held each Saturday morning at the health unit. The increase is con-sidered due to the periodical rise in the cases, experienced about every five or seven years.
