Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Stacey were in Gresham last Saturday to attend the annual summer school of the Oregon fox breeders' association.

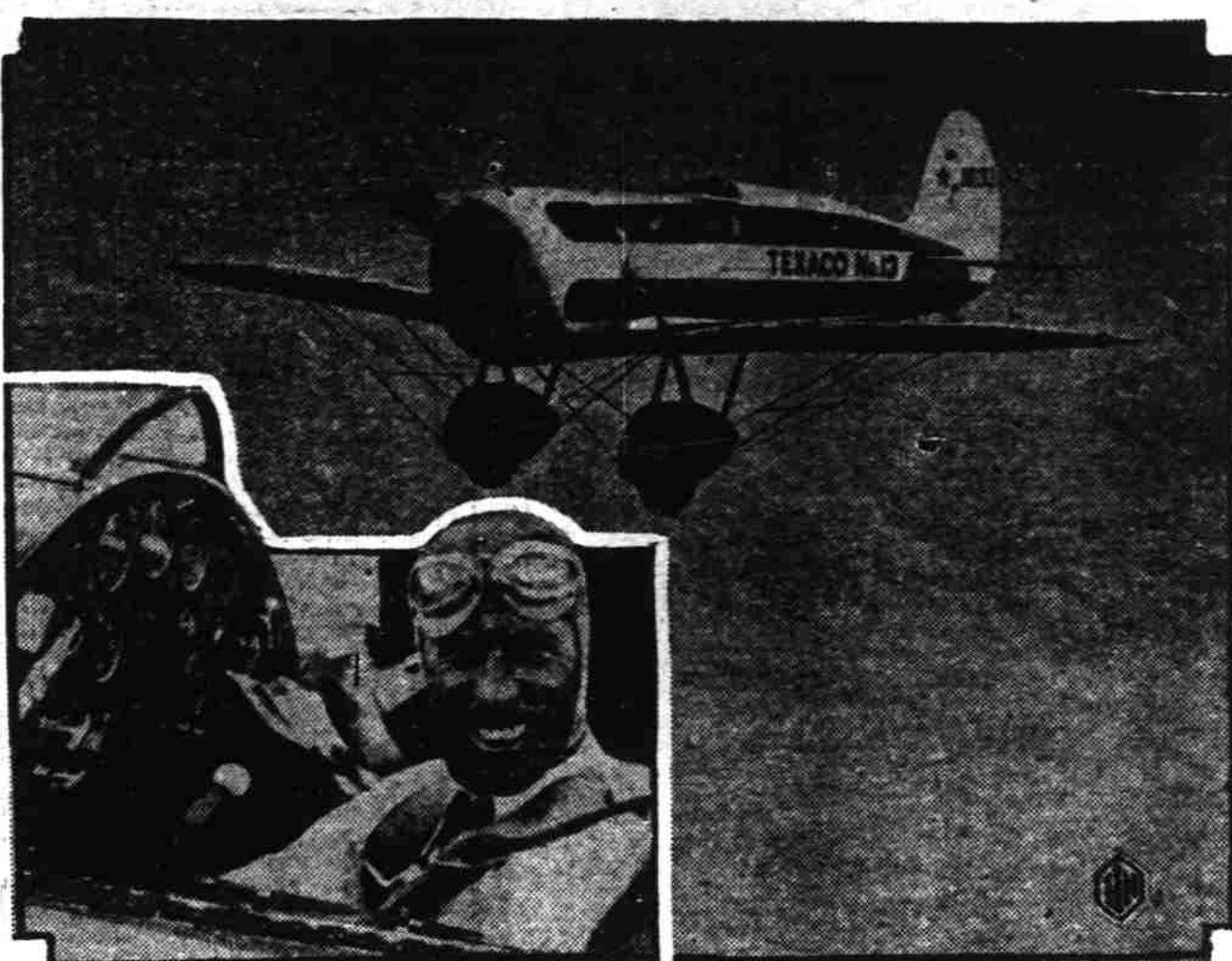
Frank Devlin, who is city carrier for the Salem postoffice, and family are spending a two weeks' vacation in British Columbia.

Paulsens Back at Hubbard After Interesting Tour of United States and Mexico

HUBBARD, Aug. 19.—Mr. and Mrs. B. Paulsen, daughters, Tillie and Helen, and son, Alfred, returned home Wednesday, August 13 from a two month's auto trip covering 10,391 miles, and taking them as far south as Florida.

The Paulsens found the highways in splendid condition with about 85 percent either pavement, hard surfaced or gravel. The dirt roads were mostly detours because of highway construction. The many auto camps, with comfortable cabins added to the enjoyment of the trip. The cabins ranged in price from \$1.75 to \$4.00 per day. The group carried a kodak and succeeded in getting a large collection of pictures including auto camp cabins and other things of interest.

Drinking water was a problem which was solved by mixing lemon juice and ice in the water in a large jug-shaped thermos bottle. Mr. Paulsen said that he tasted all kinds of water, some of which he could hardly recommend.

The Paulsen family left Hubbard Wednesday morning, June 18, and stayed the first night in an auto cabin at Grants Pass. The next day they enjoyed the ride over the Redwood highway which they reported to be in splendid shape. Sunday they visited with Mr. and Mrs. William Schnoor near Davis. Monday morning the trip was again started, going toward San Francisco via Fairfield. At San Jose they had the car looked over. The Paulsen family found the trip along the California coast to be very beautiful and very scenic; the oil wells attracted their attention. The Spanish Mission at Santa Barbara was also interesting to the group. After leaving Ventura the Paulsen family saw a lion farm where lions are raised for circuses and also to rent to the moving picture studios. The young cubs were to tame that even a stranger could pick them up. They saw the new California university which was near completion. The family spent two days at Hollywood sight-seeing. There were the beautiful Japanese gardens, the many studios, and the residences of noted moving picture actors and actresses, and many other places of interest which make the city of Hollywood famous.

Mexico Interesting

By the second Sunday of the trip the Paulsens had reached Mexico. They drove through Tia Juana, a Mexican drinking and gambling place and spent the night in a cabin at Chula Vista at National City. The party left National City at 6:00 o'clock the next morning, June 30 and drove back to San Diego. They spoke of the Carrizo canyon as being very beautiful, but as barren of vegetation as any country could be. The Imperial valley was found to be very fertile and level and the temperature there was 110 degrees, while at Phoenix the temperature was 114 degrees. In the vicinity of Phoenix the land appeared to be good for farming and stock raising. There are large areas of flat land that lay fallow for irrigation. After leaving Phoenix they experienced a thunderstorm and got quite a little rain. The family stayed one night at Douglas on the border opposite a Mexican town just across. There was a high fence between the two towns. It was in this vicinity that they saw all kinds of cactus, and large vultures. The birds prey on the dead cattle along the roads, for there it seems that the people do not bury, but depend on the vultures, crows, and other scavengers to eat up the dead stock.

East of Douglas the Paulsens found some cotton grown and so stock raising. At El Paso they found the population to be either Spanish or Mexican. There the temperature was 112 degrees. At Odessa they rented a nice stucco cabin for \$2.50. Just before reaching Odessa they saw a line of oil wells blazing and upon inquiry found that the waste was being burned as there were no refineries. The weather was cooler in that section of the country, being from 95 to 100 degrees. At Sweetwater the part rested from travel, washed clothes and cleaned the car. The temperature there was only 88 degrees.

In driving through the city of Dallas, Texas, Mr. Paulsen found a negro who was running a filling station. Mr. Paulsen bought some gasoline from the negro who was afraid to take a traveler's check. They were delayed there about half an hour while the negro had to be convinced by the banker there that the check was good. Cotton is grown some by negroes in that section of the country. Mr. Paulsen learned that there was little money in raising cotton and he saw many bales outside going to waste.

The family reached Pensacola in the evening and spent the night on the beach near the city. They saw an old ox cart hauled by a team of eight oxen. At Pensacola the Paulsens gathered magnolia leaves and palmettos to bring home.

W. B. McKEY RITES HELD AT HUBBARD

HUBBARD, Aug. 19.—Funeral services were held for William Brannick McKee at the Hubbard city hall Monday afternoon with Rev. H. L. Grafton, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Aurora, officiating.

Many friends and relatives gathered in respect to the memory of the 80 year old Hubbard pioneer. Lovely flowers were in profusion.

Mrs. L. M. Scholl and Mrs. Julius Stauffer sang two duets, "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "Rock of Ages." Mrs. Stauffer sang a solo, "Christian's Goodnight." Miss Anita Berens was the pianist. Pall bearers were Frank Barrett, Henry Adams, John Smolinsky, Bahne Paulsen, R. H. Williams, and Jerome Jackson.

Mr. McKee died at his home, "Roseworn Gardens," early Friday morning having suffered several months with cancer of the neck glands. He had lived there about 30 years and had made the grounds beautiful with many flowers. He was also interested in the onion industry. He was born April 13, 1856, in Missouri, later he moved to Lawrence, Kansas, with his parents. From Kansas Mr. McKee went to California, then to Pomeroy, Wash. He moved to Hubbard in 1889 and two years later was married to Mrs. Corinna Burnett.

Mr. McKee is survived by Mrs. McKee, one son, E. A. McKee, two grand children, Dorothy and Phyllis, two step daughters, Mrs. M. Pomeroy and Mrs. R. McMorris, both of Dayton, Wash., one brother, C. N. McKee, of Salem, and one sister, Mrs. J. M. Robinson, of Pomeroy, Wash.

Interment was in the Hubbard cemetery.

From three to five carloads of pears will be put up daily when a full crew starts working.
