

Salem Heights Residents Resent Loss of Bus Service

BUS SERVICE IS WANTED

Salem Heights Community Taking Steps to Secure Passenger Line

SALEM HEIGHTS, Aug. 20—The residents of Salem Heights have been getting together the past week with a view to securing some kind of bus service since the Southern Pacific's abrupt cessation of service.

No warning was given by the company in any way that would have enabled the residents of this district to have secured some kind of transportation and take up where the company left off. Since that time members of the community have conferred with the company officials asking for a resumption of service with greatly reduced time service but no avail.

By taking off the busses the people feel that a great hardship and injustice has been done this end of the line and that they are being discriminated against. Inasmuch as the running distance is no greater from State street to the Heights than from State street to the fair grounds. The people are therefore in the mind to negotiate and cooperate fully with anyone who might wish to place a bus in service and failing this may place a community owned bus into operation.

The Salem Heights folk also resent a slap taken at them by a Hollywood paper stating that "they are howling now, but they got what was coming to them after breaking their necks to vote for the franchise." Regardless of the merits or demerits of the S. P. franchise Salem Heights community happens to be outside the corporate limits of the city of Salem.
