## WIGFALL EVIDENCE POINTS TO SUICIDE

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP).—Wholesale evidence tending to prove Charles Y. Wigfall, 35, former Vancouver, Wash., minister and eccentric Portland attorney, committed suicide instead of being murdered by a robber poured into detective headquarters today.

Detectives investigating the case since last Thursday when Wigfall, wounded mortally, drove his automobile two miles for medical aid, said their findings, gained from women, weapons and wills, indicated the young attorney shot himself with his own revolver.

Two revolvers, one found hidden in brush near the scene of the shooting, and another discovered in Wigfall's desk in the offices maintained by Judge W. W.

McCredie, the attorney's law partner, have been identified as Wigfall's property.

Investigators said an outstanding piece of evidence came from Mrs. Mary A. Worsley, 52, asserting Wigfall tampered with a lease on her property, and indicated her threats to expose him led to self destruction. Mrs. Worsley said she named Wigfall beneficiary in a \$5,000 insurance policy because "he told me I reminded him of his mother."

Two insurance policies for \$75,000, one dated August 11, were discovered in Wigfall's effects. They named Mrs. McCredie, his law partner's wife, as beneficiary. One will, held by Judge McCredie, who refused its contents, police said, willed Wigfall's head to a medical school and bequeathed \$1,000 each to two women, one Miss Ruth Whitfield, Vancouver high school dean of girls. Another will bequeathed money and property to various women, although Judge McCredie with whom Wigfall lived, said the estate was "imaginary."
