OTTAWA, Sept. 9. - (AP) -Upward revision of the Canadian tariff as a measure to relieve unemployment and economic depression in the dominion was forecast today in the message from the throne which opened a special session of the Canadian parlia-

ment. The session, convened specifically to deal with unemployment, heard the governor general read a four-sentence speech in which amendments to the enstown act and the customs tariff were mentioned as being expected "to meet the usual conditions which

now prevail." As the enunciation of the conservative party recently came into control of the government, the governor general's speech was regarded as conforming with the

party's traditional advocacy of a high protective tariff. The first day's session was adjourned after Captain George Black, member from the Yukon, was elected speaker of the bouse of commons.


