CANADA PROPOSES TARIFF INCREASES

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—(AP)—Upward revision of the Canadian tariff as a measure to relieve unemployment and economic depression in the dominion was forecast today in the message from the throne which opened a special session of the Canadian parliament.

The session, convened specifically to deal with unemployment, heard the governor general read a four-sentence speech in which amendments to the customs act and the customs tariff were mentioned as being expected "to meet the usual conditions which now prevail."

As the enunciation of the conservative party recently came into control of the government, the governor general's speech was regarded as conforming with the party's traditional advocacy of a high protective tariff.

Bids on Armory Are Opened at Cottage Grove

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., Sept. 9.—(AP)—A low bid of \$42,194.98 for the construction of a new armory here was submitted by Stevens, Niblock and Leabo, Cottage Grove, it was found today when the 12 bids were opened by Lieutenant Colonel Riley and Major Hamilton, representing the general staff.

The staff will award the contract from Salem, probably tomorrow.

A Lombard, Eugene, was with in \$100 of the low bid. The high bid, \$53,600, was submitted by P. M. Odum, Salem.

Construction is expected to start within ten days. About five months will be required to complete the structure. Hunziker, Smith and Phillips, Eugene, are the architects.
