

Oregon Yew Wood is Praised by Nation's Best Archers

L. L. DAILY BACK HOME

Monmouth Archer Wins Awards at National Meet Against Large Field

MONMOUTH, Sept. 12.—Rev. L. L. Daily, president of the Alibi Archers' club of Monmouth, who participated in the national archery tournament held at Chicago, August 12, commemorating the 50th anniversary of organized archery in the United States, returned this week after a month spent in visiting his old home at South Bend, Indiana, with other stops at Des Moines, Boone and Murray, Iowa; and various points in western Missouri, Nebraska and Kansas where he renewed old time friendships and was the guest of relatives.

No disagreeably hot weather was encountered on the entire trip. In fact, he says the sun didn't shine between Oregon and Illinois, as the drought of the Rocky mountain section and the midwest area was being broken by welcome rain. In Chicago a cool wind from the lake prevailed providing an atmosphere much like that of the Willamette valley.

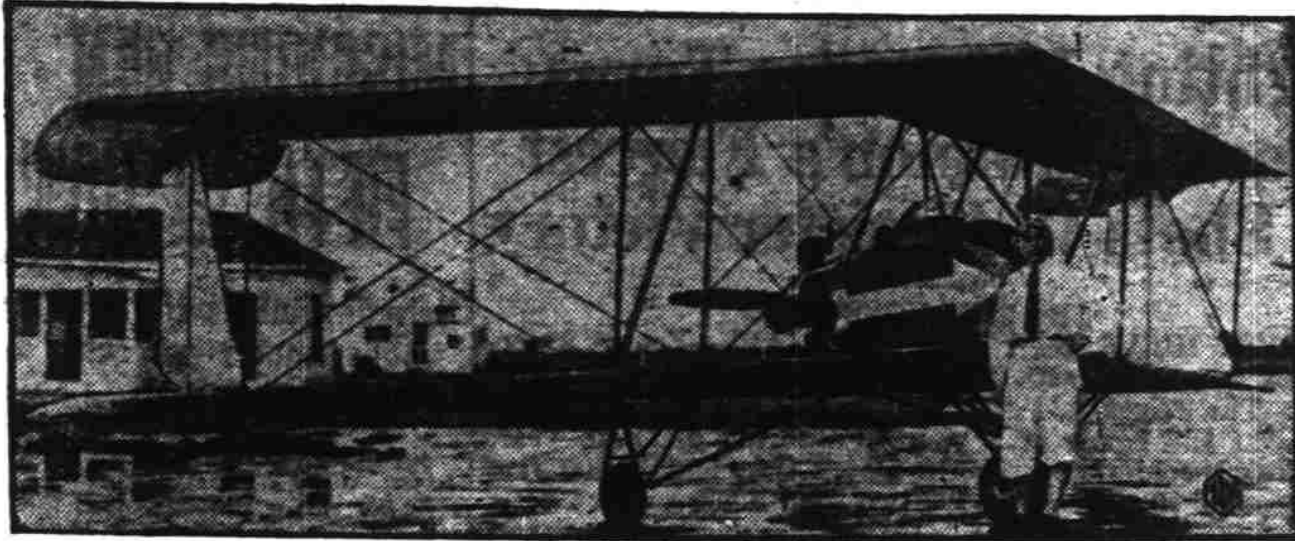
Corn crops generally throughout the midwest were seriously damaged by the drought; but one area was observed in northwest Missouri and southwest Iowa, of about 100 square miles on river bottom land which was normal good.

Oregon Yew Shown
Daily's attendance at the Chicago tournament was primarily motivated by his desire to display the advantages of Oregon yew wood for bows, and he says that his long distance bows, reflex target bows and arrows of Port Orford cedar which he used in the events he entered, created something of a sensation.

In the free style event which he won at 424 yards, 2 feet and 11 inches, at Chicago, following close upon his record at Longview of 409 yards 2 feet and 11 inches, he used a 100 pound bow of Oregon yew against competition involving bows of Osage orange, laminated bamboo, and snakewood, weighing 150 to 175 pounds each. He shot regular style, while archers using the heavier bows shot Indian fashion, trying on the back with both feet holding the bow, and pulling the bowstring with both hands. Competition was close with Prof. L. D. Curtis, of Tempe, N. D., who developed the Indian style of shooting among the eastern archers, and Roy Curtis, of Racine, Wisconsin, both shooting over 400 yards. In addition to receiving the national free style championship of the United States trophy, Daily was voted a Dillion gold medal at the annual business meeting.

Meet Well Attended
The Chicago tournament was largely attended by the most noted exponents of archery in the United States, and by many authors of books on archery. Daily found shooting easier to accomplish there than here, due, he be-

lieves, to the fact that air currents there are less variable than in the west. At an exhibition shoot in Missouri he achieved 438 yards, though the weather was warm and very humid.

Returning home via Ogden and Salt Lake, Daily stopped to confer with archers interested in Oregon yew bows, and gave them demonstrations of free style shooting with his bows.

It is interesting, incidentally, to note that while the history of archery is as old as the story of mankind, the bows used by Robin Hood and his merry men of Sherwood forest, were made of yew; and the intrepid English archers at Agincourt and Cressy were armed with long yew bows.

The use of Oregon yew wood for bows is fairly well established, locally, where it is found in the coast range, and in the Cascades. It is hard, fine-grained wood which must be allowed to season thoroughly after cutting, to gain the desired resilience. That found in the Cascades is considered by many bow-makers to be superior since the colder inland winters cause a slower growth—hence a finer grain of wood.

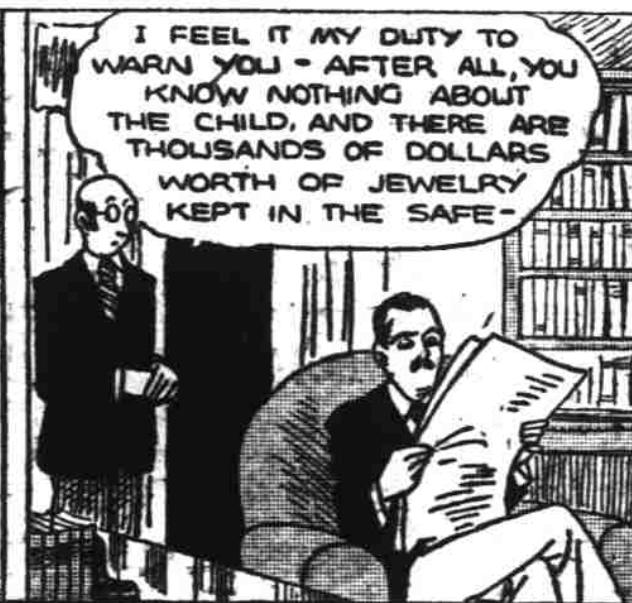

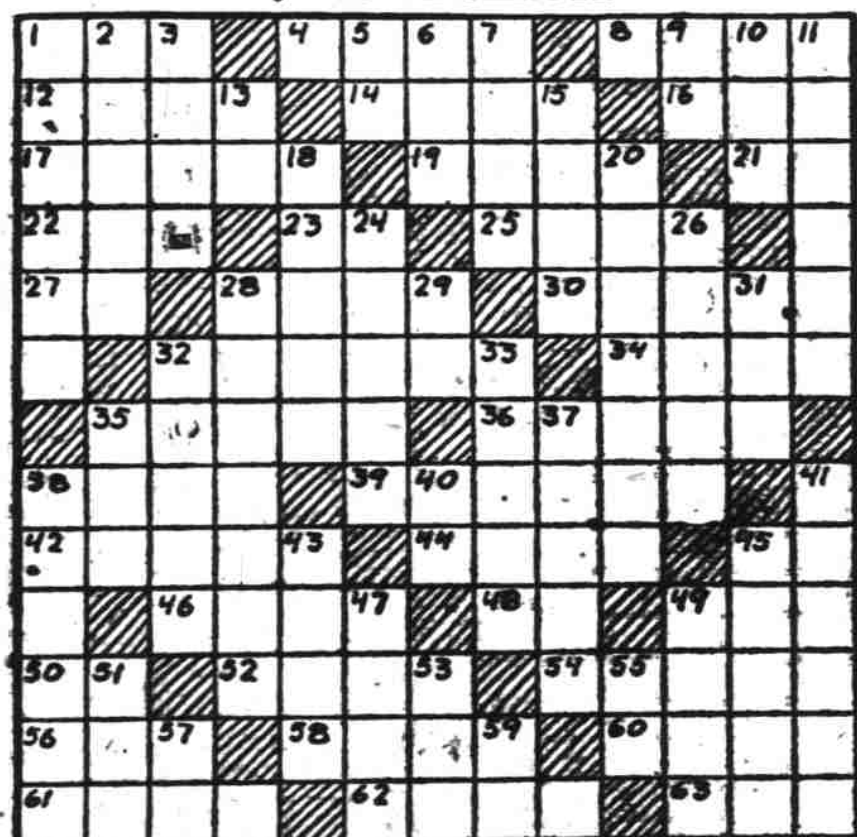
