Dr. and Mrs. R. Lee Wood of Salem, spent Tuesday at the home of Mrs. Eva Robinson.

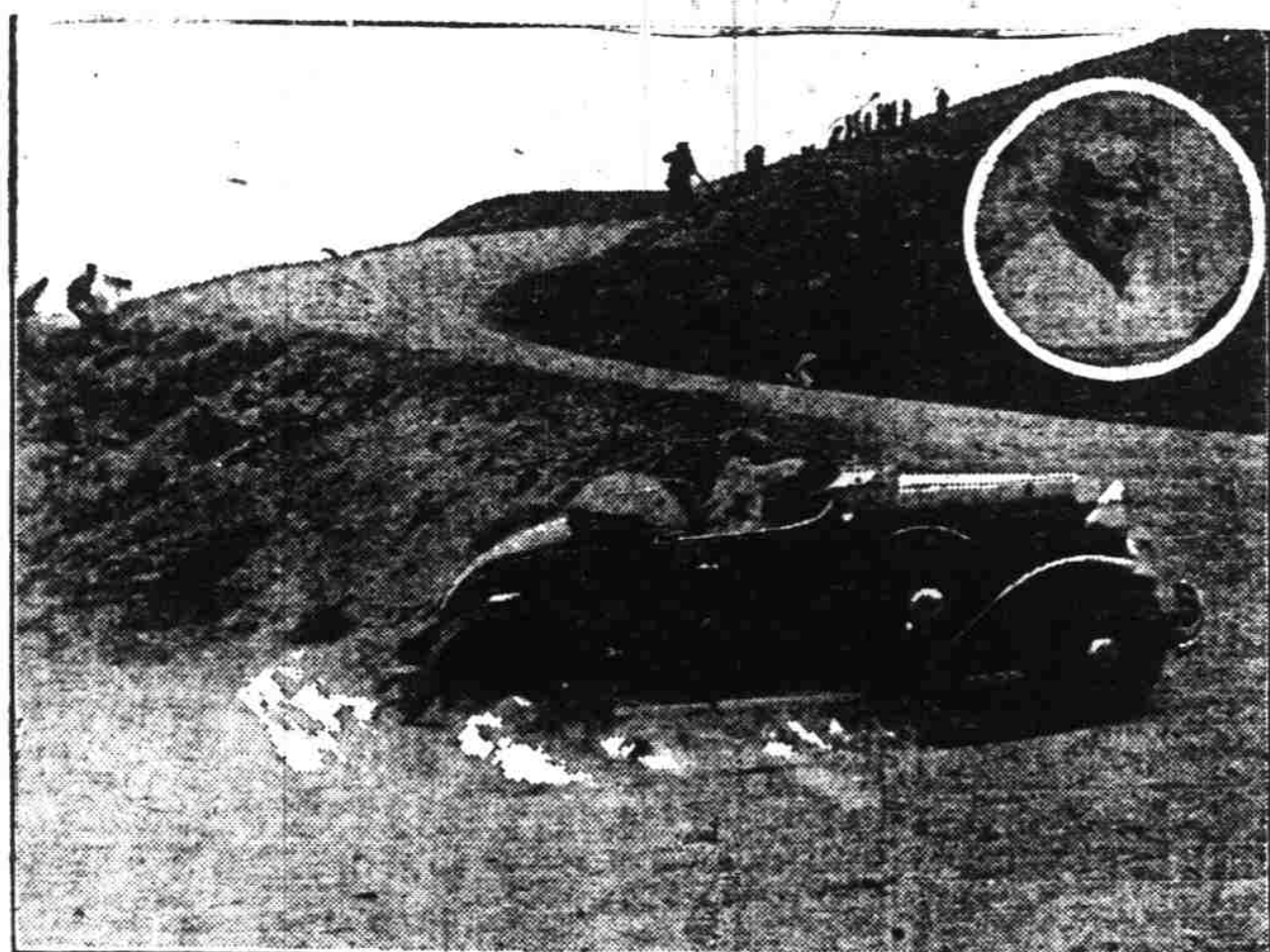

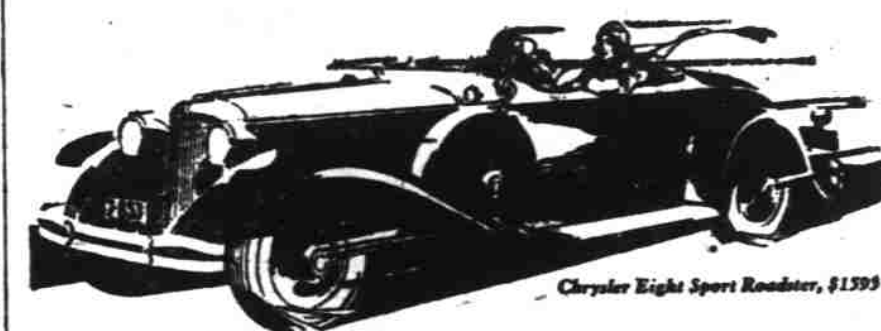
