Two Salem Pastors to Attend Convention at National Capital

Fifteen thousand members of the Christian church (Disciples of Christ) will meet in Washington, D. C., next month, to hold three aignificant conventions within a nine day period. B. F. Shoemaker of the Court street Christian church and D. J. Howe of the First church and many others in the state are planning to attend these conventions.

For three years, this religious body, now numbering 1,750,000 has been preparing for this gathering at the nation's capital. The programs are now completed and most of the details for the handling of such a large delegation arranged.

A thousand young people will hold a five day Youth convention, October 15-19. Robert Burns of Atlanta, Georgia, is the president. The young people vill discuss problems and issues having to do with modern youth and the church.

The International convention of the Disciples of Christ will begin on Tuesday evening, October 14. R. A. Long, a layman of Kansas City, is president of this convention and will preside over its sessions.

During this convention, October 14-19, the new National City Christian church will be dedicated on Sunday morning, October 19. The building is located on Thomas circle. Over 40,000 individual members of the churches throughout the nation have contributed to it.

Week's Sermonette

Renewal of Strength

By REV. W. G. LIENKAEMPER (Pastor Reformed Church) "They that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength"

-Isa.: 149: 31. Now that vacation days are over we need strength for our alletted tasks in the home or at school, in the workshop or at the office. In our text we have the promise of strength. There are different kinds of strength: physical, intellectual and spiritual strength. The source of all strenth is found in God, who has many

ways of renewing our strength. Vacation does not mean a period of idleness, but rather of change of occupation. An idler will take up his work with flabby muscles, cobwebs on the brain and a grouchy spirit because he did not wait upon the Lord for renewed strength of body, mind and spirit.

This strength is not communicated in a mechanical way. It is a vital, dynamic power and it must be obtained by a vital pro-

We get it through faith and fellowship. That is what "wait upon the Lord" means. By faith we lay hold of God and through it appropriate His mighty power. By faith we can say with Paul: "I can do all through Christ who strengtheneth me." And again: "When I am weak then I am strong;" and by constant fellowship with Christ and by working for Him we develop this strength, so that, according to the promise, "we shall mount up with wings as eagles; shall run and not be weary; shall walk and not faint."
