Doubts Litigation Would be Prolonged

"Estimates that from one to two years would be required for such litigation in my opinion are entirely too high," declared City Attorney Trindle last night. "Even if we are forced into court to obtain the plant we can proceed much faster than this, profiting by the mistakes other cities

The attitude of the Oregon Washington Water company toward the apraisal is largely a matter of surmise except for the fact that their leaders have frequently stated that they would ask the total amount of their investment in the plant as their sale price. WASHINGTON, Oct. 1-(AP) -The department of justice today launched an extensive investigation into charges that large oil companies were attempting to obtain illegally from the government Colorado oil shale land worth billions of dollars.

# **Metschan Talks Rates and** Taxes in Address on Radio

NEGOTIATIONS Republican Candidate Compares Portland Rates Wtih Tacoma and Seattle; Also Taxes

> (The following is a portion of the radio address delivered by Phil Metschan, republican candidate for governor over KEX Tues-

> After tonight it will be charged that I am the voice of the power trust. The power trust does not need my voice, for it has the voice of Julius Meier and The Telegram.

Mr. Holman was silent on Seattle rates the other night. He did ot tell you that the great mass of Portland home owners are already paying less money for their lights and power than the people of Seattle. And he didn't tell you that the home owners of Tacoma and Seattle are paying fifty per cent more taxes on their homes than Portland home owners, and that in thousands of instances the high taxes are passed on to renters. Well, I am telling you, and I am going to tell you more.

Ar. Holman has told you much of municipally owned power plants, but he neglected to tell you of the municipally-owned plant at Forest Grove, where power and light rates are notoriously high. He didn't tell you that rates there are 50 per cent higher than in Hillsboro, six miles away, where they use private power. Indeed, there are many things that Mr. Holman didn't tell you.

Mr. Holman spoke in glowing terms of the blessings of municipal ownership in McMinnville. The town of McMinnville is a splendid little city, a beautiful and prosperous little city, but it has not been helped by municipal ownership. Neither would it be injured if its citizens were compelled to use private power.
