no open the way to mandamus proceeding to compel action.

An adverse decision on the application by either the state engineer or the reclamation commission would be subject to appeal to the circuit court and from there again to the supreme court, the attorney general holds.

"The rule of law is well established, both by the statute which provides for action of mandamus and by the decisions of the courts, that mandamus will lie to compel a public officer to perform a duty which is directly enjoined upon him by law," the opinion reads.

Another phase of the power situation upon which the governor sought enlightenment at the hands of the attorney general dealt with the present authorities of the state engineer and the power project and take over its operation.

State Hasn't Right To Own Utilities

In his opinion Van Winkle holds that while there is ample provision in the constitution for the operation of power and light utilities by incorporated cities and towns, and even by ports to a limited extent, there is no such provision as regards the state.

"I do not find any statute which authorizes the state of Oregon, through any of its officers, boards, commissions, or other representatives, to acquire, maintain or operate power projects, other than such as may be incidental to the maintenance and operation of any of the state institutions or properties," the opinion reads.

"Specifically, I do not find any statute authorizing the state to maintain and operate such projects for the purpose of furnishing power or electric current to the municipalities or to the public generally."

"It would therefore seem that the state of Oregon has not placed itself in a position to take advantage of the provisions of the federal power act, but has authorized incorporation of cities and towns to do so, as well as ports for limited purposes."

Previously the company has stated that it would sell for its original investment plus capital expenditures since July 1, 1927. The total of these two items runs between \$1,250,000 and \$1,300,000. Members of the water commission feel the company's new inventory and appraisal is to give the company still higher figures to use as a trading proposition with the city.

Under the charter amendment passed May 16, 1930, the city council has 30 days after October 1, 1930, when the appraisal was filed by Baar & Cunningham, to make a written offer for the plant to the water officials. The latter have 60 days in which to accept or reject the proffer.

In the event the city's offer is turned down, the city council has a specific mandate under the charter amendment to acquire by condemnation proceedings, the plant of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company here.

only one major application pending before the department. This is the so-called Grant site project of the California-Oregon Power company and this application I have referred to the reclamation commission for its consideration, inasmuch as I regard it as involving a matter of state policy upon which the commission, rather than the engineer, should pass.

"While several other preliminary applications have been filed with this department involving major power projects it would be impractical to complete the work on these applications necessary to intelligent action by this department, in less than six months time, so that there can be no action by my department on any of these until after the legislature can meet and legislate upon a new water policy if it is so inclined to do."

FOX FUR INDUSTRY OUTLOOK IS BRIGHT

So Says Mrs. Jessie Lang
Now Head of Large Farm
In West Washington

People of the United States last year spent \$500,000,000 in the purchase of furs and of this amount \$250,000,000 was spent outside of the United States.

This statement was made by Mrs. Jessie M. Lang, who is here from Tacoma where she is president of the Peacock Silver Fox and Fur company. Mrs. Lang also said that at the present time fur production ranks seventh in the industries of the United States. Because of this condition Mrs. Lang feels the fur industry future to be bright.

There are 40 acres in the Peacock Silver Fox and Fur farm, which makes it the largest such farm in western Washington and is located 72 miles southeast of Tacoma. At the present time there are 300 silver fox on the farm; about 60 rabbits of the Angora Wooler type; 200 ordinary rabbits being reared to feed the foxes his spring imported from Russia, and whose fur is becoming very popular. The Fitch is not a native of the United States according to Mrs. Lang but it develops well here. In addition to being very popular for its fur, Mrs. Lang says the Fitch is a delightful pet.

Much Stock Owned
By Salem People

The Peacock Silver Fox and Fur company has several stockholders among Salem people, and Mrs. Lang will take possession of a Salem residence. Mrs. Lang has been responsible for the reorganization and present development of the company within the last year.

"There are many fascinating things about raising animals for fur production," said Mrs. Lang. "The pups of the Silver fox are cunning little things with which to work. There are times when it becomes necessary to have a 'wet' nurse for some of the pups and a cat does nicely at first. Later a dog will make a perfect mother and become very fond of the fox puppies. We have a manager and his wife and two workmen who are kept busy all the time working with the animals."

Mrs. Lang reports a very fine business this fall, with a considerable increase over last fall. In a few weeks Mrs. Lang will leave for California where she is taking a number of pairs of foxes.

For the past few days Mrs. Lang has been the guest of her son, Ted Lang, and she will leave Monday for Seattle, where she goes on business.

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Eminent Jurist Dies Suddenly; Heart Failure

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 2.—(AP)—Judge Frank S. Dietrich of the United States circuit court of appeals at San Francisco, died suddenly here today of heart disease as he was starting on an automobile drive to San Francisco.

He had spent several days here and last night attended a wedding of a socially prominent young couple.

Judge Dietrich, who has spent the latter half of his 67 years of life in Idaho, had climbed to an eminence in the ranks of American jurists that clearly pointed his way to the supreme court of the United States.

The new proposal is different from the \$5,000,000 bond issue on the proposed utility plant to be built by the city. Police quoted Russo, who is 65 years old, as saying the weapon was discharged accidentally as his hand encountered it in his pocket. Clark was standing in front of him and received the bullet in his back.
