McDonald filed claim for \$2125 damages, the viewers allowing him but \$12. Under the order signed yesterday, the court will pay such damages as are established as result of the litigation now in court.

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MAYOR AGAINST CHANGING CODE

Exception to Building Rule Granted Church Held Not Justified

Mayor T. A. Livsey said last night that unless other evidence were presented to change his mind he would veto the ordinance passed by the council Monday allowing an exemption of the building code to the First Evangelical church now under construction at Summer and Marion streets.

The mayor explained that owners of residence property in the block had protested against the special privilege granted the church in being permitted to build within four feet of the property line. The building code restricts property holders in the block from erecting any structure within eight feet of the property line.

The mayor said that members of the zoning commission had joined with the property owners in protesting the special privilege. "Should the church be granted this right, it would mean that in the future builders of other properties in the block, would want similar exemptions," said the mayor.

Dam Plans for Klamath River Told by Copco
Plans for a dam across the Klamath river a short distance below Keno were submitted to C. E. Stricklin, state engineer, Wednesday by the California-Oregon Power company.

According to Stricklin, the dam, which is to be approximately eight feet high, involves neither storage nor diversion of water but is planned only as a protection of adjacent lands from flooding.

MAY COOK, PIONEER OF THIS CITY DIES

Mrs. May Cook, an early resident of Salem and sister of Mrs. Ida E. Burrows of this city, died here October 8 at noon at the age of 65 years.

She was born in Madison, Wisconsin, April 17, 1865 and came to Salem with her parents in 1883. Later she moved to Hood River. In addition to Mrs. Burrows, the following brothers and sisters also

survive: W. L. Dinsmoor of Redwood, Calif., D. H. Dinsmoor of Portland, and Mrs. Grace D. Barnes of Beverly Hills, Calif.

Funeral services will be held from the W. T. Rigdon and Son chapel this afternoon at 2 p. m., Rev. Fred Albain Well officiating.

STUDENTS WARNED AGAINST SOCIETIES
Fair warning to members of the sophomore class that they should not become affiliated with secret societies which exist in the Salem high school was issued today by Principal Fred Well.

The principal gave admonition to this effect at the sophomore class meeting held during the activity period.

Well outlined the provision of the state law on secret societies and told the youngest class of the high school that he expected every member to help him in enforcing the law.

With this friendly warning, Well told the students he would consider any pledges to the secret orders deliberate violation and such sophomores as become affiliated will suffer consequences of the act.

The students manifest, in the man, an appreciative reaction to the talk.

Claim Zone Law Not Followed
The measure was brought up Monday night by Alderman Henry Vandevort. He urged immediate action since work was under way on the church. By unanimous consent, the council placed the bill on third reading and it passed without a negative vote.

Members of the zoning commission said yesterday that officials of the church did not comply with the provisions of the zoning ordinance. This requires a petition of the property holders and a hearing before the commission before a zone change can be granted.

HOMES DESTROYED TOTAL THOUSANDS

"Three thousand three hundred and eighty-eight homes were either totally or partially destroyed by fire in Oregon in 1929, entailing losses aggregating \$2,049,621; approximately one-third of the total losses for the state," says State Fire Marshal Clara A. Lee in a circular letter to the fire chiefs of the state in introduction to a campaign of education in the schools to encourage the habit of carelessness in and about the home. It is issued in connection with the Fire Prevention week activities of the department.

Large color posters have been prepared and sent out to the chiefs of each county, setting forth the 1929 losses to home properties in each county and the list of the major causes that are responsible for fires in the home, for distribution among the schools.

Most Fires due to Carelessness
Fully 90 per cent of the fires in the homes, it is claimed, are due to carelessness and the pupils are requested to copy the list of causes and have their parents check the conditions in and around their homes and to correct the dangers found.

This is the first Fire Prevention week effort to curtail the enormous annual fire waste which, according to department records, amounted to \$6,808,000 in Oregon last year, representing a per capita loss of \$7.15.

The campaign has been carried into every county and community of the state, through the medium of the fire chiefs, commercial, civic and patriotic organizations, on a scale larger than ever before waged and public speakers have been furnished by the department for gatherings throughout the state.

Physician Files Claim on Estate
Petition for allowance of his claim for medical services was filed yesterday by Dr. George E. Vehrs against the estate of Ida M. Keene. Dr. Vehrs alleges that there is still due him \$148.50 for his services to the late Mrs. Keene, and that the claim, when duly presented was returned to him, marked, "examined and rejected," by A. A. Keene, executor of the estate.
