### What Paris is Wearing

**P**ARIS—The continued popularity of black and white as fashionable costume colors in Paris, has led to a whole new fashion regime which depends on color combination for its smartness. Gloves, shoes, hats and jewelry that effectively ally black with white, are seen in increasing numbers wherever smartly dressed people gather.

Black and white jewelry is conspicuously fashionable in Paris these days. Combinations of onyx and crystal, and onyx and milky quartz are perhaps registering on two-thirds of the fashionable outfits seen in Place Vendome, Rue de la Paix and the Champs Elysees—the three fashion centers of the French capital.

There is a noticeable tendency among these new pieces of jewelry, to make important use of black, especially where costumes are white or light gray. An effective example of this fashion plan is the costume pictured—a white crepe de chine hat and frock, dotted with tiny black rings. The accompanying necklace is almost entirely black onyx rondels, with a small portion—say six inches in length—
