

Woodburn Judging Team Wins at Pacific International

HIGH SCHOOL BOYS SCORE

First on Beef Cattle and Fifth on all won by Woodburn

WOODBURN, Oct. 28.—Out of the 69 stock-judging teams representing high schools from every state in the northwest, Woodburn high school team placed fifth and won first place in the beef judging contest held at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland.

Oren Ottoway, a member of the Woodburn team, placed fourth in individual scoring, just a few points less than the third highest boy, who gets a trip to Kansas City along with the first and second individual scorers. Two boys from Independence, the winning team, and a boy from Dayton won the first three places and the free trip to Kansas City. Out of a possible 1000 points, Ottoway scored 179.

3 Classes Judged

Three classes of stock were judged, Jersey and Holstein cattle, Poland China and Duroc Jersey pigs and Hereford beef cattle. Woodburn was presented with a beautiful banner for winning in the beef division.

Woodburn high school's team, composed of Oren Ottoway, Glenn Seely and Harold Yoder, along with their instructor, Ronald E. Burnett, went to Portland Friday night. On Saturday night they attended a banquet given to all high school stock judging teams and on Sunday they attended a meeting of the Future Farmers of America.
