Following comment in an editorial from a Coos Bay paper under date of October 25, 1936, will probably furnish you cheer and advice you that Mr. Hawley is appreciated by the high-minded and good people of his district:

LET CONTRACT FOR BRIDGE IN COUNTY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Oregon State Highway commission sold \$1,500,000 worth of highway bonds, let contracts totalling about \$283,000 and adopted the Neah-Kah-Nie highway from Cannon Beach south as part of the official Roosevelt highway at a meeting here today.

Dean Witter and Co. were the high bidders for the block of bonds, paying a premium of \$27,856. There were ten other bidders, the bonds were dated to mature in 25 years with the first group, representing one-twentieth of the entire amount, due April 1, 1936. The bonds bear 4 1/2 per cent interest. The bonds match a like amount appropriated by the federal government.

Other contracts awarded today included:

Clackamas and Marion counties: bridge over Pudding river on county road at the county line three miles east of Hubbard. Hargreaves and Lindsay, \$17,980.

Marion county: construction of frame shop building at the state highway shops in Salem. A. J. Anderson, \$17,930.

Members of the Marion county court attended the meeting of the highway commission in Portland yesterday. They were interested in the opening of bids on the Marion-Clackamas county bridge over Pudding river which the two counties will pay for.

The matter of the North Santiam highway was not brought up at the commission meeting yesterday. In November the annual meeting of the commission with the federal road bureau and forestry service will take up prospective work for 1937 at which time the North Santiam project may be presented.

Baillie Claims Gillock Charge Totally Absurd

W. H. Baillie, superintendent of the state training school for boys, declared Thursday that the charges preferred against him by Robert Gillock, a former inmate of the institution, were as absurd and unfounded as those filed by Vernon Levey and two other boys. Gillock alleged that he was forced to wear an "Oregon boot" and was kept in solitary confinement.

Baillie said the entire matter would be threshed out at a hearing here Saturday, and he had extended statement to make.

Alderman Purvine had in his possession last night a bond signed by the paper company guaranteeing the installation of a Sturtevant clinder cone or one as good, within four months, or else the forfeiture by the company of \$5000. He also had a letter to the council in which the company stated it would not ask for the right to build a loading track outside the proposed new building on Trade street.

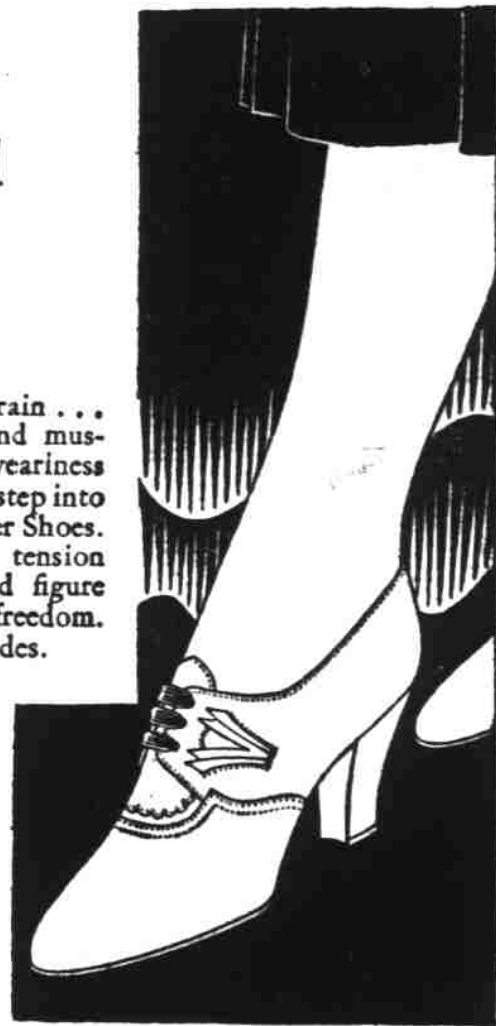
