REVELATION OPENS FOR NAZARENES

Rev. J. B. McBride of Pasadena Will be in Charge Of Campaign

A revival crusade will open Sunday in the Church of the Nazarene with Rev. J. B. McBride of Pasadena, Calif., as evangelist. The local church is observing a week of prayer in preparation for the campaign. The large chorus choir and orchestra will be directed by Rev. Fletcher Galloway, pastor, who spent several years as an evangelistic singer.

Rev. McBride comes to Salem after more than 30 years of successful evangelistic work in churches of many different denominations. He has just closed a campaign in Texhoma, Oklahoma, in the First M. E. church, where there were more than 100 conversions.

The special music will be an attractive feature of the revival services. A male chorus has been recently organized for the church and will create a great deal of interest in its first appearance two weeks ago. This chorus will sing Sunday morning and also several times during the week night services. The male quartet composed of Prof. Clyde Hoffer, Frank Litwiler, J. J. Hoffer, and Clarence Litwiler will sing and also several other musical combinations of the church.

There will be services each evening at 7:30 o'clock, and at 11 and 7:30 on Sundays. The church is located one block south of Center street on 19th street.

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RETURNS

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Christian Pastor Home From Many Conventions; Has Interesting Report

After listening to reports and discussions on prison conditions over the country, Rev. D. J. Howe, pastor of the First Christian church who is just home from a month's trip south and east, is convinced that the Oregon state prison, of which he is chairman, is not on a bad place as prisons go. In fact, conditions here so far as moral and spirit are concerned, rank among the highest.

Such is his statement after attending the national prison congress in Louisville, Kentucky, October 10 to 14, at which 44 states were represented. He was the only representative from Oregon. The congress included all national agencies dealing with crime, juvenile crime problems, prison officials and other groups. Leading prison officials, as well as doctors and psychiatrists, were in attendance.

General consensus of the leaders gathered was that more attention than ever before is being focused on the problem of crime, its causes, prevention and cure, and while much progress has been made in the past 60 years, there are still serious problems to consider.

Much of the crime could be checked by proper moral training and teaching in the early school days, the congress agreed. Overcrowded conditions in the prisons are largely due to this lack of early training. Prisons in the country hold today 115,000 prisoners, while there is capacity in the buildings for but 90,000, it was brought out at the congress.

Considerable emphasis was placed also on getting away from the penal idea in these institutions, and getting to guiding the way to rebuild lives.

Rev. Howe hurried from Louisville to Washington, D. C., where he attended the three conventions of the Christian church, including the International convention of the Disciples of Christ, the National convention of the United Methodist church, and the First World conference of Churches of Christ, which was in session from October 14 to 23. These conventions

marked consummation of a three-year program commemorating the 190th anniversary of Pentecost, which has been largely observed in many churches of the world.

Feature of the closing days of the convention was dedication of the new National City Christian church in Washington, principal speaker for which was R. A. Long, personal acquaintance of Rev. Howe, millionaire lumberman and founder of Longview, Wash. Admission to the dedication was by ticket only.

RALLY OFFERING SECOND IN STATE

More than 30 teachers and officers of the Jason Lee Memorial Methodist Episcopal church were present at the fellowship dinner Tuesday night, and participated in the business meeting and program which followed. It was reported that the rally day offering, amounting to \$71.00 was second largest in the entire state of Oregon.

A committee on leadership training reported recommending the organization of a class to be held on Wednesday nights, starting the first of the year.

Christmas plans were discussed, and a brief talk by the pastor on "Psychology, the Teachers First Assistant" was given. H. B. Carpenter is superintendent of the school, total enrollment of which was reported at the meeting to be 529 with the average attendance during the past month of 367 or 69 per cent.

"Grace unto you, and peace, from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." 2 Thessalonians 1:2.

No more significant words can be found in all the realm of Divine revelation. Grace is the cause of all spiritual blessing, and peace is the consequence.

I. GRACE. The clear definition of this term is not found in the dictionary. The word of God alone reveals its true meaning. Salvation is by grace. Eph. 2:8. Justification is by grace. Romans 3:24. God is now seated on His throne of grace. Hebrews 4:16. The Holy Spirit who is administrator of salvation is called the spirit of grace. Hebrews 10:29. The scriptures are called the word of grace. Acts 20:32.

Grace means the unmerited favor of God towards humanity. Favor shown to the miserable is called mercy; favor shown to the poor is called pity; favor shown to the suffering is called compassion; continued favor to the obedient is called patience, but favor shown to the unworthy, which includes all humanity, is called grace. God the Father is the source of all grace, Jesus Christ the Son is mediator of all grace, and God the Holy Spirit is the administrator of grace to needy believing.

II. PEACE. There is no peace without grace. Grace is the cause—peace the consequence. Peace denotes the end and absence of strife. It signifies that satisfactory terms have been established between belligerents. The peace of God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Romans 5:11. 'METSCHAN IS BEST MAN'—SHUMWAY
Farm Leader Comes out in Opposition to Grange Power Bill

A. R. Shumway, Umatilla county rancher and a leader in the Oregon State Grange, was on the last night over KEX at 9:35 to speak in behalf of Phil Metschan, regularly nominated republican candidate for governor.

Mr. Shumway's address appears as follows: "The Grange leaders who were reported to have drawn the grange district power bill. In his talk the Umatilla county rancher explained why thousands of farmers cannot support the district power bill, which he declares is unnecessary.

"Farmers are interested in taxes," said Mr. Shumway upon his arrival in Portland. "They are not going to vote for something which will directly have and will risk of letting promoters increase their taxes."

Mr. Shumway has delivered two or three talks in behalf of Mr. Metschan, and against the power district bill in Oregon.

"I have known Phil Metschan for 30 years and I believe he is better fitted to be governor than any other man now seeking that high office," he said.
