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## SCOPE OF LEVEY INQUIRY LIMITED

Undernourishment, use of Boot and Punishment Claims Probed

The scope of the investigation of charges preferred by Vernon Levey, 15, that he was subjected to cruel and brutal treatment while an inmate of the state training school for boys, will be limited to the accusations of undernourishment, use of the "Oregon boot" and corporal punishment.

This was announced here Wednesday by the state board of control. The investigation was started before the board here last Saturday, but on motion of Secretary of State Hoss, was referred to the state child welfare commission in Portland. Levey alleged that he suffered serious burns when an "Oregon boot" was removed from his leg by means of a torch. Three other former inmates of the school filed charges similar to those preferred by Levey.

The board of control authorized its secretary to send a letter to the state child welfare commission informing its members of the scope of the investigation, and offering its cooperation in the probe. The hearings will be held in Portland and at the school near Woodburn.

The child welfare commission also will receive a record of the partial investigation held in Salem last Saturday, together with a large number of letters received by the board in connection with the probe.

W. H. Baile, superintendent of the school, admitted that Levey received the burns, but declared that they were due to an accident while removing the boot. Levey escaped from the school on six different occasions, and at one time stole a truck and quantity of merchandise belonging to his employer.

## FOUR DIVORCES ARE GRANTED IN COURT

Four divorces were granted by Judge Gale S. Hill when the cases were presented before him in department two of the circuit court yesterday. All went by default, and in each case plaintiff was the wife.

Fidelis Ford was granted decree of divorce from Algie R. Ford.

Agnes H. Meranda, in her suit against Clifford G. Meranda, was granted divorce and restored her maiden name of Arlene in Vancouver in 1929. She charged cruel and inhuman treatment.

Pauline E. Needham was given decree of divorce from Errol L. Needham, whom she married in 1918, and restored her maiden name of Pauline E. Dowell. She charged he had violated marriage vows.

Gertrude E. Street was granted divorce from William H. Street, to whom she was married in Salem in 1919. He charged that he abandoned her last January. There are two children.
