CHRISTMAS SEAL CAMPAIGN STARTS

Sub-Agents in Communities Of Marion County are Named by Leader

Appointment of sub-agents for handling the 1930 tuberculosis Christmas seal sale in a number of the rural districts was announced yesterday by Mrs. J. E. Blunkhorn, county chairman. Names of all workers in the rural areas have not been given, because some districts have not sent in report of acceptance.

Sub-agents now outlining campaign for their districts are: Mrs. William Wurster, who will work in Aurora, assisted by E. F. Morrison; Mrs. Julia Dalmas, Donald; Mrs. Ruby Horner, Gates and Detroit.

Miss Guadalupe Bidgood, with assistance of Camp Fire Girls organizations will be in charge at Hubbard. This group will also canvass the Broadacres, White school and Whiskey Hill territory. Mrs. Otto Goertzen will have the Mill City and Taylor districts; Mrs. John Cox, Turner, Pleasant Point, Cloverdale and Crawford; Margaret M. Ritchie, Mt. Angel school, St. Benedict and girls' school.

Mrs. Frank Erickson will conduct the sale in the Liberty, Prospect, Pringle and Salem Heights districts. Eugene school teacher, at Woodburn, Arbor Grove, Hall, Belle Passi, McKee and Johnston; Mrs. R. Thomas of Jefferson will have charge of the sale there and in Parrish Gap. Marion, Looney Butte, Hillier, Sidney and Talbot; Mrs. R. Betzer will be in charge of sale in Kelzer, Clear Lake, Buena Crest and Mission Bottom. Sale of seals will start the day after Thanksgiving, and the goal of sales in Salem and the rest of the county is \$50,000 seals. By agreement between the Red Cross and National Tuberculosis association, the Red Cross ends its annual membership drive Thanksgiving and in order not to conflict with this, the tuberculosis seal sale will not start until the following day. These two groups have not been working together on the sale for a number of years.

The mail sale in Salem is being handled entirely by the Woman's club, seals to be sent out in this way early in December. Last year 3,500 letters were sent out this way, and this year the list has been increased to 4,200. Mrs. R. W. Southwick is in charge of the seal sale.

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COMPANY TENDERS OVERCHARGED SUM

Through error and inadvertence, W. P. George and Sons of the White House restaurant were overcharged on use of electricity for the period extending from November, 1926, to September 1929, the Pacific Northwest Power Service company says in answer filed yesterday to the Georges' complaint seeking damages on account of the overcharge.

The power company says there was a gross overcharge of \$283.47 and an undercharge of \$52.51, leaving an overcharge of \$230.96. The company further alleges that on February 28, 1930, without demand or notice on part of the plaintiffs, the defendant tendered the Georges payment of \$230.96 in cash. The company yesterday paid the same sum into court for the defendant's use, asked that the case be dismissed.

The Georges seek several times the amount proffered by the power concern in their complaint.

REGISTRATION AT SCHOOLS HEAVIER

Enrollment in the Salem schools the first of this month was 62 pupils greater than for the corresponding period a year ago, according to reports filed with the city superintendent. The registrations so far this year total 4,770, as compared to 4,718 at the end of the second month of school last year.

COURT RULES ARE CHANGED BY HILL

Details of Motion Days and Docket are Announced By Circuit Judge

A number of changes in rules for department two of the circuit court, presided over by Gale S. Hill, were announced yesterday by Judge Hill and include new rulings on motion days, motion calendar, trial calendar, time allowed for pleading over, disposition if no appearance, default divorces, and some additions to rules on preliminary injunctions. New rules were placed in effect November 1.

Following are from the new rules:
First and third Tuesdays of every month, except during summer vacation, and except on non-judicial days in which case the day following, shall be motion days at Salem. The second and fourth Tuesdays will be motion days at Albany. All opinions and decisions of the court, so far as practicable, will be announced on motion days.

Parties may Have Cases set
The motion calendar will be made up by the clerk prior to each motion day. Prior to each motion day, clerk will make the trial calendar and either party desiring to have a case placed upon the trial calendar shall serve upon opposing counsel a motion to set such trial and file same with clerk. If either party appears upon motion day any case upon trial calendar shall then be set for trial at subsequent date.

Neither party is present the motion shall be continued until the next succeeding motion day; and if neither appears at that time, the matter will be stricken from the motion or trial calendar.

A default divorce case may be granted without written motion and or tried at any time with the district attorney present and consenting thereto. A decree ought not be granted on uncorroborated testimony of parties.

Ten days shall be allowed for answer or further pleading, unless otherwise ordered by court, when demurrer, motion or preliminary matter is disposed of.

Teams participating are the "Y's" Men under Fred Duncan, gymnasium representatives with Clarence Litwiler, Willamette university students headed by Hayes Beall and Minute Men captained by Alan Kafoury.

The next meeting of the group will be Thursday night at 6:00 o'clock while the contest will close with the banquet meeting at 8 o'clock, Wednesday, November 12.

Two prizes are held up for the young men to work toward. One is for the individual with the highest score and the other is for the team with the highest score. Rules and prizes for the contest are listed as follows:

(1) Ten men consist each team.
(2) Each man turns in a card with new members listed under his own name. He may get any one he wishes to work with him in getting new members so long as they are not members of the contest.

(3) Each new member counts 25 points. When cash is paid for the membership before 6 p. m., November 12, the number of additional points, which are given one for each dollar, are doubled. Memberships worth \$12 will be worth 12 points; with cash, 24

points—plus 25 points for new member—49 points.
