

HOTEL PROJECT GIVEN BACKING

Executive Board in Charge Of Plans has Meeting Here Monday Night

The executive committee of the Salem Community Hotel corporation met Monday for its regular meeting in the Y. M. C. A. building, Wm. McGilchrist, Jr., chairman and Grover W. Hillman, associate chairman of the citizens committee now being formed reported satisfactory progress. This executive committee will be composed of 150 of Salem business and professional men. It is expected that this organization will be completed within the next ten days.

Governor A. W. Norblad, associate chairman of the executive committee said: "The traveling public today is accustomed to demand up-to-date, modern, comfortable accommodations and one of the outstanding needs of the city of Salem is just such a hotel."

"The public today is traveling today not so much from city to city, but from hotel to good hotel. I have been in practically every capital city in the United States and Salem is probably the only capital city that does not have a modern up-to-date up-to-date hotel. Salem is one of the most beautiful capital cities in the union. It is on the main highway and should have many visitors. The various state institutions and state departments now bring many visitors to the city who are looking for just such hotel facilities. Better hotel accommodations will bring more of these guests. Salem cannot hope to keep pace with other cities in this vicinity until this need is met."

Strategic Time to Build Says Hicks

T. M. Hicks, general chairman of the movement said: "There probably will never be a better time to build than just now. It is conceded that the costs of building materials are generally lower today than they have been for years and that building can be done now at less cost than for a long time. It is estimated that this new, fire-proof hotel building will approximate a cost of \$250,000, and that about \$150,000 will go directly to labor. The other \$100,000 will be spent largely in Salem for materials and supplies."

"We believe that this project, in addition to meeting a serious need in the form of a modern fire-proof structure, will do much to advertise Salem. Every citizen will benefit as substantially all of the cost of the building, both for and against, a total of approximately \$250,000 will in turn be redistributed to the merchants and business men of the city. The next meeting of the executive committee will be held in the Y. M. C. A. building tomorrow noon at 12:15 o'clock."

(Continued from page 1) ers, \$35,350. Teaching instruction, \$221,919. Included in this sum is \$600 for textbooks, both desk copies and for indigents.

Operation of plant, including janitor salaries, supplies, fuel, light and power, water, telephone, printing, \$32,400. Maintenance and repairs for both inside and outside buildings, \$12,000. Auxiliary agencies, including library, health service and transportation of pupils, \$26,020. Fixed charges of insurance, appraisal and rent, \$4,437. Capital outlay for new furniture and equipment, \$5,000. Debt service, both principal and interest on bonds and interest on notes, \$81,692. Emergency, \$1,407.

TEXTBOOK CHANGES TO BE CONSIDERED

The state textbook commission will meet in Salem next Monday to change or renew approximately one-third of the textbooks used in the Oregon schools.

For the grammar grades the texts subject to change of renewal are civics, geography and the third and seventh grades. Oregon history for the sixth and eighth grades.

High school subjects subject to change or renewal include American history, biology, civics, elementary economics, elementary science and manual for the ninth grade, French, general mathematics for ninth grade, higher arithmetic, world or general history for ninth grade, social problems and Spanish.

Members of the commission are J. A. Churchill, president of the Ashland normal school; A. C. Hampton, Astoria; George Hug, Salem; Austin Landreth, Pendleton and R. R. Turner of Dallas.
