Livestock Board May Act Against Breeding School

The state livestock sanitary board has authority to suspend the Graham Scientific Breeding school from conducting courses in cattle breeding, unless such courses are conducted through the state schools or colleges, according to a legal opinion handed down by the attorney general Wednesday. The school is located in Portland.

The opinion was requested by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, who is secretary of the livestock sanitary board.

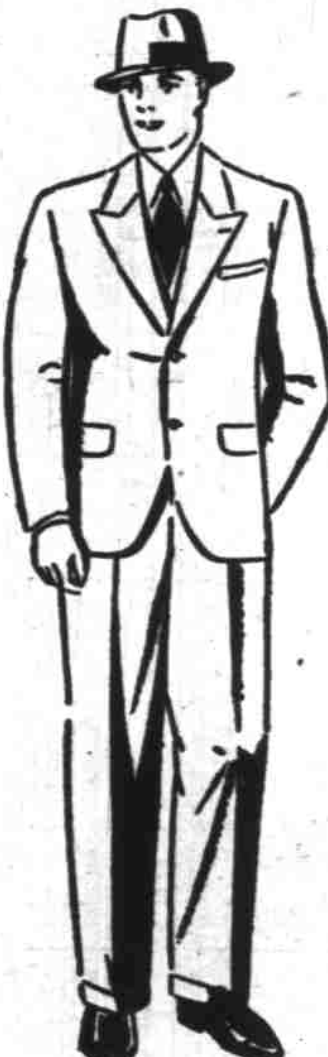
