

CLUB OPPOSES HEALTH MONEY

County Court, not Commonwealth Fund, in Charge Request

The Hollywood Community club is circulating other community clubs of the county seeking support for its resolution to the county court opposing any appropriation to the Marion county health unit and calling for a reorganization of county health work. The letter from the president, P. M. Gragory, and the secretary, W. H. Henderson, asserts that the expenditures are under control of the Commonwealth fund of New York and much money is spent on other things than real medical or nursing service. It claims the Commonwealth fund is demanding that the appropriation of \$42,285 be increased to \$55,000 for 1931.

The letter cites the contribution of Polk county for health work as \$500 per year and of Linn county \$600, and further declares that nearly half the personnel drawing salaries are neither doctors nor nurses.

The following resolution of the Hollywood club is sent with the letter:

To the honorable county court of Marion county, to the honorable mayor and city council of Salem, Oregon:

Comes now the Hollywood Community club of Salem, Oregon, and respectfully represents to and petitions your honorable bodies as follows:

Budget Reported.

1. The Hollywood Community club has appointed a committee to investigate the expenditures of the Marion county health unit and finds the receipts and expenditures of that unit to be as follows:

2. Prior to the initiation of the present plan the expenditures for this work were only a fractional part of the above expenditures and the cost of this unit to the tax payers has increased year by year until it has reached the above figures.

3. In the opinion of this club this expense is not warranted by the work performed or the results secured by this unit.

4. There is a tendency on the part of the Marion county health unit to increase the scope of its work and to enlarge the personnel and salaries of its department and the cost to the tax payers, and threatens to pay an undue influence upon the affairs of the city and county.

Wherefore, your petitioner respectfully requests that no appropriation be made for the Marion county health unit as now constituted; that the department be reorganized substantially in accordance with which the county roads are now efficiently handled; and that the county court assume direct control of this department, employing such assistance as may be necessary.

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STEELE SEEKS DEEPER RIVER

Canalization Plan Sound and Possible Through Cooperation, View

"Let's see if for once we can co-operate and put across a valuable project for the entire Willamette valley," urged F. Steele, secretary of the Eugene chamber of commerce, in talking on canalization of the Willamette river at the local chamber's meeting Monday noon.

"It's so easy to be hot-stove leaguers, sitting back and telling about things that can be done before they are started," Steele added. "I know that there is money to be made for the Willamette valley in this project and it can be accomplished."

Steele took the place of Frank Jenkins, Eugene publisher, on the program, Jenkins being detained by business.

Steele said that Lane county's 60 billion feet of timber would have a greatly augmented value if the Willamette was canalized. He said timber on idewater brought about \$3 a thousand while inland timber, such as Eugene is surrounded by, is selling for \$1.50 a thousand.

Present Held Proper Time. Steele sketched the development of rivers in Europe and in the eastern part of the United States. He declared that now was the time for Oregon to see its inland waterways developed.

"The trouble with Oregon is that we depreciate our own ability and undertakings," Steele said. "We praise our neighbors to the south and to the north but we allow ourselves to be called Web-feet, Beavers and Ducks. We should start talking up our own wares."

Steele asked the chamber to send representatives to a special river traffic meeting to be held Monday, November 24, in Oregon City. He said Senator Charles McNary was helping materially in the project to canalize the river. It was through McNary's efforts that a federation appropriation for the surveying of the river was obtained.

Additional expense accounts showing expenditures of \$2339.18 in behalf of Julius L. Meier, independent candidate for governor at the November election, were filed in the state department here today. Expense accounts previously filed in connection with the Meier campaign aggregated more than \$70,000.

Expense accounts filed here today showed that Louis Block, prominent Portland man, expended \$2250, in behalf of Mr. Meier's campaign. The Meier for governor club of Clackamas county, through A. A. Price, chairman, expended \$39.18 in behalf of the independent candidate for governor.

T. B. Neuhausen of Portland expended \$2658.20 in behalf of Charles L. McNary, republican nominee for United States senator.
