BOOKLET RECOUNTS LADD & BUSH STORY

Pictures, too, Reveal Progress of Firm Begun by Asahel Bush

An interesting bit of type holding in its lines much of vital history to Salem has been compiled in commemoration of the 62nd year of the establishment of Ladd and Bush bank.

The paper bound magazine form book of 33 pages tells the story of the establishment of the bank, March 29, 1868, by Asahel Bush, father of A. N. Bush, and the Ladd and Tilton bank in Portland. The bank building was begun in 1868 and still preserves the same exterior finish it boasted when it was one tiny room.

In 1882 Ladd and Tilton withdrew from the partnership, and Mr. Bush bought the building and complete liquidation of the partnership took effect, although Mr. Bush retained the firm name of Ladd and Bush.

Building Beauty Shown
In the sixth decade from its founding, the bank has become incorporated, has increased its floor space many times, and has passed the six million mark in deposits. The beauty of the building is shown in many pictures in the anniversary book and many stories dealing with the history and development of Salem are also printed in connection with the development of the bank and Salem.

One picture is missing—that is of A. N. Bush, beloved and known by every citizen of Salem, who took up the work of his father and has carried the bank on to its present position in the community's life. Mr. Bush is at the bank
