

SERVICE PLAN IS COMPLETE

Constitution for Community Organization Adopted at Adjourned Meeting

Constitution and by-laws were adopted at the adjourned meeting of Community Service Wednesday night, these providing for annual meeting and election of officers on the first Wednesday after the first Monday in October. Between meetings, affairs of the organization will be handled by the executive committee. Special meetings may be called at any time.

Report of the executive committee recommending immediate incorporation of the organization was approved.

For the purpose of making clear a number of points concerning the new organization, the secretary has prepared the following series of questions and answers, in which C S stands for Community Service, A C for Associated Charities, and S A for Salvation Army.

Q. Is C S the same as community chest?

A. No. A community chest is generally intended to cover all purposes for which financial drives are made. C S funds are for relief of unfortunate only.

Q. Does C S do away with A C?

A. No. A C, like S A, has its own organization which C S does not presume to regulate in any way.

Q. If I contribute to A C or S A am I expected to contribute to C S also?

A. A contribution to S A or A C is equivalent to a contribution to C S. All are for the same essential service.

Q. If C S does not reduce the number of organizations why C S?

A. A C was without funds. S A drive fell short. C S is purely a financing organization to assist S A, A C and all other accredited relief work.

Q. How are funds of C S handled?

A. C S funds are carefully entered in records both by individual contributors and by groups with which the individual contributor is identified, if any. Just what any individual or group is or is not doing through this organization can be shown in a moment's notice. All money is deposited in a local bank and checked out with numbered checks through a check register. No money is handed out to relief cases or organizations.

Bills for actual relief proper investigation and voucher.

Q. If the number of organizations is not reduced how is duplication of service reduced?

A. By a confidential exchange through which every case is checked and confined to the proper source of relief. Such an exchange is being organized now and will be in operation henceforth.

Q. Should the number of relief agencies be reduced? If so, why not?

A. The ideal would doubtless be one large, central agency through which all would function. But as yet we find those who will co-operate only through S A, others only through A C, still other clubs and organizations that prefer to conduct a measure of relief service for unfortunates among their membership or cases they feel called to assist, and so on. Experience and the growth of mutual confidence will gradually merge these difficulties. At present the confidential exchange will prevent duplication, which has never amounted to as much as has been made of it.

Q. How should relief cases be handled with respect to C S?

A. They should be referred to A C, S A or any other relief agency functioning in the city. If an ex-service man or dependent, refer to relief committee of Capital Post, American Legion. After investigation and check through the confidential exchange, the agency in charge will call upon C S for necessary financial assistance.

LIQUOR POSSESSION BRINGS JAIL TERMS

Possession of liquor cost Charles Peak, Vincent Grosjeans and Ed Crites 30 days in jail when they appeared before Justice of the Peace Brazier Small on Thursday. The three were apprehended by state traffic officers recently when the car in which they were in collided with another on the highway near Woodburn.

Fred Gustafsen asked time to consult an attorney when he was brought into justice court on Thursday to answer to a charge of non support. He is in jail, as he was unable to raise the required bail of \$1000.

Dennis Seeley demanded a hearing when he was accused of assault and battery by Elsie Seeley. Date of the hearing has not been fixed.

Raphael Vega was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Small when he was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Bail was fixed at \$1000.

Arthur Peterson of Silverton was convicted of disorderly conduct and will be sentenced Saturday by Justice Small.

CRANK CASE OIL'S RECLAMATION SEEN

Another item on the nation's conservation program is seen by Prof. F. G. Baender, head of the mechanical engineering department at Oregon State college, in reclamation of crank case oil drainings. Baender so told the Salem Lions club when he addressed that body at its regular Thursday noon luncheon session.

Baender declared that experiment has shown that oil used in the crankcase does not wear out, and that after reclaiming the first time it is even, better oil than when first used. Such reclamation could be accomplished at the small cost of two cents a gallon after the initial equipment and be secured, he said. Cost of equipment would be minor.

The professor avowed that there is not a lot of difference in heavy and light oils, or thick or thin oils, so far as the motorist is concerned, because viscosity or internal friction should be about the same for good grades of either at a temperature of 200 degrees F. In other words, Baender warned his listeners that they should know what is the viscosity at 210 degrees of the oil they use.

He conducted an experiment to show that flames will not touch a metallic object touched by water on the other side, this being the basis of his explanation of the fact that all oils are alike at certain temperatures.

Arguments Upon Truck Law Case Heard in Court

Arguments were heard in the state supreme court here Thursday in the suit brought by R. C. Kelsey against Governor Norblad and other state officials to enjoin the defendants from enforcing a law enacted in 1929 providing that four wheel trucks and trailers of combined weight of 34,000 pounds shall not operate on the highways.

Kelsey alleged that the law applied only to six wheel trucks and trailer type of truck. Enforcement of the law has been deferred because of the injunction proceeding.

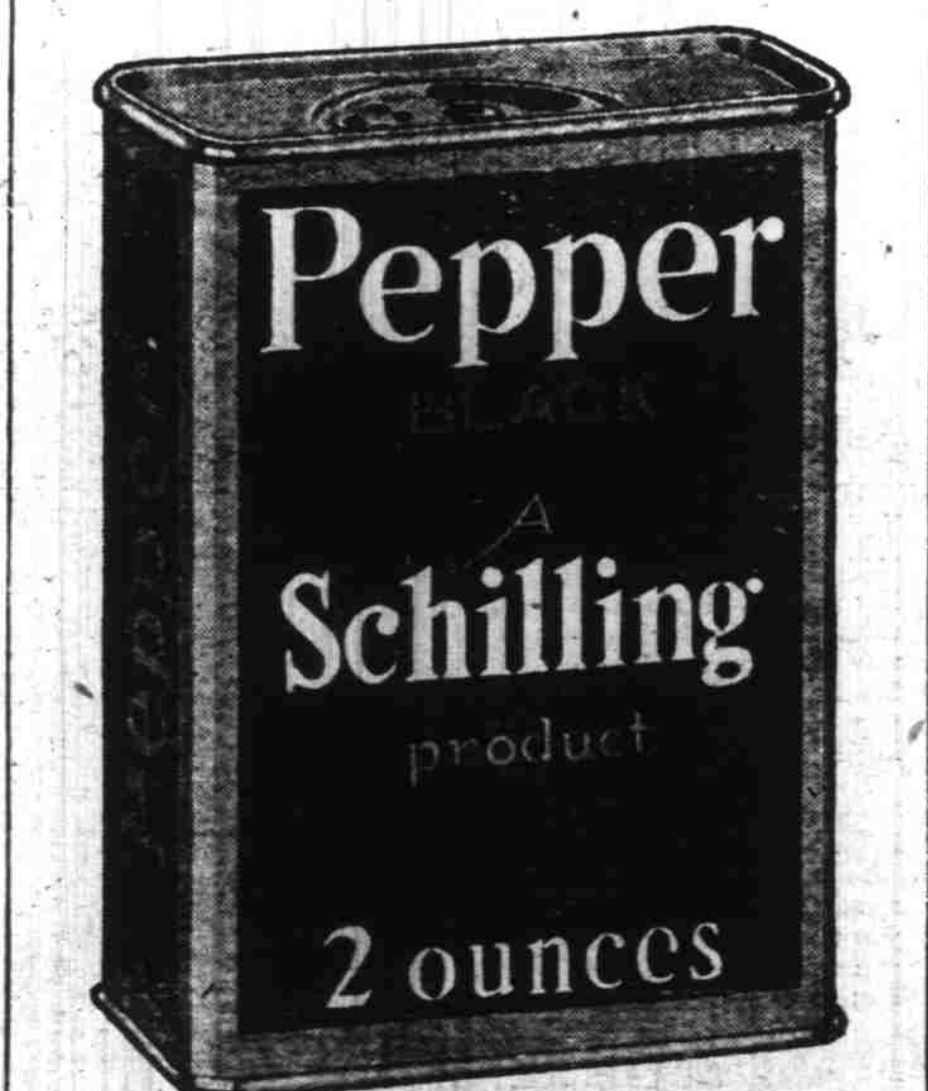
